EASTERN.

LITCHFIELD, Vt., July 29.—McMahon has withdrawn as republican candidate for nomination for Governor, leaving Col. R. H. Hughes with opposition.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Several treasury officials, who went to London a week ago, returned this morning, having been engaged by the syndicate, returned this morning with a large number of cancellations sent to the secretary by the syndicate since the first of June.

The largest amount of business ever done since the organization of the Post Office department, in the manufacture and shipment of stamps, stamped envelopes, wrappers, etc., is now taking place. The cause is attributed to the abolition of the postage privilege, which is usual now that so many clerks are away from the summer leave of absence, that reducing the clerical force will not be just a loss to the Post Office business, but a gain, so that altogether the syndicate have received and paid for fifty millions of the pieces, but are still in the process of payment in the debt statement.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—All the New England governors and other well known citizens together with the state organizations of this city, with Connecticut, Maine, and New Hampshire, are joining in the Rhode Island clam-bake today.

BOSTON, July 30.—Lieutenant Blodell died from injuries received by the R. I. accident last night. Mrs. Dooley, of Elmira, lies in a critical condition. The remains of the deceased are being forwarded.

MEMPHIS.—Mrs. Moore and Joseph Hansen, were brought before Justice Caldwell this a. m., under a warrant charging that they were accessories to the murder of Frank Moore, and disclosed their names to the police. There was no evidence to sustain the charge. The police are still investigating the case.

COLUMBUS, O.—The People's Convention, this p.m., adopted the following resolutions:

"That we declare against the infidelity of our country; when a cause or occasion fails us, it is natural for us to turn to those bounden duty of good citizens to withhold their votes from such candidates and, regardless of party affiliation, to support the best men presented for official position."

Second.—That we demand that the Democratic party have拿出ed the issue in which they had their origin, and have utilized their influence for the organization of parties in the interest of the public welfare.

Third.—That the Republican party, having control of both branches of Congress, and of the executive department, is directly responsible for the present condition as the salary grab, for squandering public lands in grants to private companies, for the removal of railroads from their natural obligation to the Government, and other manifestations of corruption, as developed by the Credit Mobilier and other investigations, and that those members of the Democratic party who have been or are candidates at the national convention equally deserve public condemnation.

Fourth.—We believe that the fundamental purpose of the government is the protection of persons and property, and not the meddling with and regulation of business interests or the assumption of such works by federal, state or municipal governments, as may be safe and convenient to be left to individual enterprise.

Fifth.—That corruption can be successfully combated only by the removal or lessening of temptation. We are in favor of the reduction of the functions now exercised by the government, and the reduction of the number of government bureaus and officials, believing, as we do, that a continually increasing army of federal officers is an evil increasing in danger as the country grows.

Today a fire was discovered in the fifth story of the government bonded warehouse on Greenwich Street, about half past ten o'clock. The fire was very effective and the fire spread rapidly along and through the upper stories, two hundred feet on Greenwich Street. Two additional alarms were sent out, and fire crews fanned up town. The flames continued to increase, and at this hour, 11:30, the roof, which is mansarded, on the Greenwich side, had collapsed, and two upper stories, have been burned. A bakery adjoining is also burned, and several tenement houses were in flames. Damage to buildings have evidently obtained control of the fire, and will undoubtedly keep it confined to the government storehouses. The building is filled with valuable goods, and there not determined what will be the result.

A heavy brick wall only prevented the fire working its way into the building. Thomas St., which is filled with tenement houses, and crowded with poor families, among whom the utmost consternation prevailed. The warehouses are in charge of W. H. Daning, the government agent. No fire has been used in the building since last winter, and the fire-to-night, it is supposed, could not have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

The government has commenced a suit against the firm of Downing & Co., glass importers, to recover \$70,000, the penalties for alleged violation of the revenue laws.

LYNCHBURG, Va.—The Republican State Convention assembled yesterday, and B. S. Sizer was elected president, with the usual number of vice presidents. Committees were appointed, and up to adjournment the committee on credentials had not reported, and it is not yet known who will secure the nomination. The convention adjourned till 9:30 p.m.

LATER.—The following is the full ticket nominated for Governor, Lt. Gov., and Lieut. of the State, Lieut.-Gov., A. Saunders Platt, of Logan, liberal; Attorney-Gen., Z. Myers, of Stark, liberal; Supreme Judge, R. E. Ewing, of Salt Lake City, conservative; Lt. Gov., of London, of Brown, liberal. The Board of Public Works: James McBeth of Altena, democratic; State Treasurer, Jonathan Hougham of Marion, democratic; State Auditor, C. L. Butler, of Franklin, liberal; Thomas Ewing, Jr., and Fred. H. Cook, both made speeches, authorizing the slate and ticket, predicting its success, and expressing the belief that the democratic convention of the 6th of August would endorse both. Senator Thompson, of Ogallala, who is reported to be in opposition to the new movement, or any one that looks to the disruption of the democratic party. Interviews have been had with other prominent democrats of Ohio, none of which indicate that the nominees of today's convention can hope for nothing from the democratic party leadership, and nominate a full ticket of their own, and make the most vigorous fight that has been made for years.

WASHINGTON.—According to a reported conversation with Attorney General Williams, the report regarding the extradition treaty with Belgium, to meet the case of Capt. Von Wille, will be submitted to the Senate to-morrow. The feelings of the military com-

NEW YORK.—The government warehouse loss will not fall short of \$100,000,000, and the amount owned by the government, and a number of firms.
