A high barometric area covers the country west of the 100th meridian, with promise of fine weather and a rising thermometer for the morrow,

The low barometric pressure has mov-ed castward and extends from west Texas northeast to the upper Missis-sippl valley, with lowest pressure over the Missouri valley. This disturbance bas caused thunderstorms or showers over portions of Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Montane, Alberta, the Dakotas, Manito-ba, Minnesota, lake region and Ohio valley, with heavy rainfall as follows: North Platte, 1.82 inch, and St. Paul 1.40 inch. San Francisco, June 28.-Rates on excess baggage on the Southern Pacific lines will be cut down one-half, begin-ning July 1.
