Labor day, next Monday, will be the last day of the regular season at Salt Lake.

A pamphlet descriptive of the course of study at the Salt Lake High school has been mailed to last June's graduates of the city school, with a view to encourage their attendance at the High school during the coming scholastic year.

FAKE MESSAGE BOBS UP AGAIN.

Tribune's Story Concerning Sheriff Wilson Was a Fabrication Pure and Simple.

HE DID NOT HOLD NUMBER 79

This Belonged to Philip Walston of Murray, Who is Fully Satisfied With Location.

(Special to the "News.")

Vernal, Utah, Aug. 31.—One of the most indignant men in Vernal is Philip Walston of Murray, Utah, and all because of a story printed in the Salt Lake Tribune of Saturday, which was purported to be a telephone message received from Deputy Sheriff Barlow Wilson of Ogden, who claimed to have drawn number 79 in the drawing for reservation lands at Provo, and was at Heber City on his return home. He is reported to have declared that the "Mormon" Church had succeeded in having their people locate all the lands and there was nothing left for the drawers. The story was such a bold one that the "News" correspondent took the trouble to look the matter up, and found that the man who drew number 79 at Provo was not Barlow Wilson at all, but was Philip Walston of Murray. Mr. Walston is in Vernal, where he filed a choice location last Monday, and is well pleased with the way he was treated, and with the country in general, and the reservation in particular.

CAUSE OF UGLY FEELING.

There is an "ugly feeling" in Vernal, as stated in the Tribune, but it is because of the outrageous policy of a portion of the press in persistently misrepresenting matters in this section. Everyone is receiving exactly the same treatment at the land office here, and the man from Colorado, Oklahoma or Texas filed in his turn along with the man from Utah, and the best of feeling prevails.

The fact that there are people all over the reservation does not mean that they are locating by any means, as it is done here at the land office, and if a man from Colorado who has made his regular filing here finds when he gets to his land a whole colony of "Mormons" Jews or Gentiles, it will not make the least difference. The land is his and the government will protect him in his rights.

DISGUSTED WITH TRIBUNE.

The officials of the land office here, including the force from Washington, are doing everything in their power to protect every man's rights and they are succeeding, too. All are completely disgusted with the continual kick about the alleged gubbing up of the land. Some of them never saw a "Mormon" until they came out here for this opening, much less being in collusion with them.

GOES TO MEXICO.

R. F. Hayward Will Manage Mexican Light & Power Company.

The company which R. F. Hayward is to become manager of in the City of Mexico, is the Mexican Light & Power company. Mr. Hayward returned last evening after a month's absence from Salt Lake to close up his business here preparatory to moving for good to the republic. A 4000 horse power plant is being built 95 miles from the City of Mexico to which electricity for power will be transmitted, and the same will be furnished to the El Oro mines 75 miles distant. The new company has bought up and consolidated ten or twelve German and English power companies previously operating in this field, and will therefore have full swing. Mr. Hayward considers the City of Mexico the best street light city on the continent, as its lights are only between 200 and 300 feet apart.

The source of power in the falls of Neasca, and to set material up there it was necessary to build 30 miles of narrow-gauge railway. There are two falls. One has a drop of 750 feet and the other a drop of 40 feet. A ledge of wood has been employed to shift machinery from the top to the bottom of the falls. The race runs on steel rails and carries fourteen tons per foot. Back of the 450-foot fall the company is constructing a reservoir, which will have a dam 157 feet high. The dam will be built on a ledge of rock and will be 100 feet wide at the top and 40 feet wide at the bottom. The consulting engineering work on the dam.
