

## JAPANESE WATCHING RUSSIAN FLEET.

Have Had an Observation Squadron in Waters off Labuan, British Borneo.

### THEY ARE BIDDING THEIR TIME.

Not Improbable that Battle Will Occur Somewhere Near Straits of Formosa.

St. Petersburg, April 11, 4:35 p. m.—Whether Vice Admiral Rojdestvensky's battleship division passed through the straits of Sundra or the Straits of Malacca, it is practically certain now that he is moving to effect a junction with the division which passed Singapore April 8. It is possible that this may not take place until the two divisions reach Cape Padaran, on the east coast of Cochin China. The dispatches from Singapore naming the ships which passed there Saturday are erroneous in several particulars, notably in the case of the Furst Bismarck, rechristened the Don, which is still at Libau.

The cruiser Russ was fitted with a captive balloon for observation purposes, and though she left originally with Rojdestvensky, at a trial off Gothland the rope connecting the balloon with the ship parted and the balloon was lost. The Russ consequently continued to return. Later she went out with Admiral Botrovsy's division.

According to the admiralty's information, the Japanese have had an observation squadron in the waters off Labuan, British Borneo, where they took the same advantage of British neutrality as Rojdestvensky did of French neutrality at Madagascar, and this squadron is believed to have been summoned by Japanese scouts to remain in touch with the Russians until they go north to the straits of Formosa where it is believed here a battle will occur. Considering the vital nature of the issue, the admiralty is inclined to think Togo will not dare to send ships to Vladivostok or leave vessels behind him to cope with the Russian vessels at that port, and that the Japanese coast and the transport fleet will practically have to shift for themselves until the naval battle is fought. The principal coast fortifications and the Russian cruisers at Vladivostok not being heavily armed could not attack them, but have could be created by the Japanese the transports and commercial ships.

So far as ascertainable, Rojdestvensky has no intention of putting into Saigon, the entrance to that port being narrow, but it is believed he will remain in the open sea.

It is learned that the Russian ships have on board patent appliances consisting of steel brushes attached to a part of the hull which, running under the vessel, can be used quite effectively to clean the bottom. The speed of warships in this way, it is calculated, can be increased at least a knot.

The admiralty is greatly gratified at the speed developed by the squadron while steaming across the Indian ocean, which is officially figured at nine instead of eight knots, as the ships made a detour northward in the direction of Jibuti in order to create the initial impression that they intended to join Admiral Nebogatoff's division. Naval men here consider that the speed attained with such a heterogeneous squadron is a remarkable feat, and a shining testimonial to Rojdestvensky's capacity.

The admiralty is not harboring any delusions on the score of the opinions of foreign experts based upon the theory that Togo's ships are armed with guns which were worn out at Port Arthur as the officials here know that there have been heavy shipments of guns from England during the past few months.

### WARSHIPS SIGHTED.

Manila, April 11.—The British steamship Empire, just arrived here from Australia, reports that on the 9th of April, she sighted the Russian battleships in the Pacific strait, between the islands of Mindanao and Basilan, which approaches close and then disappeared down the coast of Mindanao. Her nationality could not be determined, but it is believed that she was Japanese.

## MILITARY AND NAVAL DISARMAMENT FAVORED

Paris, April 11.—Baron d'Estournelles de Constant, the former deputy and president of the parliamentary group favoring international arbitration, today made his debut in the senate in a speech urging the military and naval disarmament of the states of Europe by a proportionate reduction of their forces similar to the joint disarmament of China and Argentina.

The speech of Baron d'Estournelles de Constant attracted notable attention. He maintained that naval expenses were ruining France under the pretext of defense. The naval program to which the nation was committed, he added, contemplated the expenditure of \$299,000,000 before 1917. Neither France, Germany nor Great Britain had the resources, population or wealth to meet these colossal expenditures, which ensured difficulties and debts to posterity.

The speaker cited statements made by leading statesmen of Great Britain, Russia and Germany favoring a European accord for the limitation of naval expenses and urged that this would benefit the entire world, particularly Russia, Japan and the

## RUSSIAN ATTORNEYS HOLD RADICAL MEETING

St. Petersburg, April 11.—Another meeting of the Pan-Russian congress of attorneys was held this afternoon and a resolution adopted favoring the removal of the autocratic regime and the proclamation of a democratic constitution on the basis of universal suffrage and a secret ballot.

It is understood that it is the intention of the attorneys to conduct the propaganda throughout Russia, to educate the people politically and if necessary to arm them for physical resistance to arbitrary action on the part of the authorities.

It is an extraordinary fact that no arrests have followed these meetings, at which the words were not muted and open defiance of the authorities was evident.

At another meeting held tonight the barristers decided to cancel a clause of the resolutions in which it was proposed to furnish the people with arms to resist the arbitrary acts. The meeting then decided that extreme measures would defeat the objects of the association entirely.

## SAN FRANCISCO POLICE TORTURE MRS. TORTURICI

San Francisco, April 11.—As a result of the torture to which she was subjected yesterday, Mrs. Rose Torturici, wife of the suspected murderer of Biaggio Vilardo, is mentally and physically prostrated and is under the care of a physician. In an attempt to force a confession from her, she was brutally treated by the police. She was thrust into the autopsy room at the morgue, where lay the mangled remains of Vilardo. She refused to look at the body, hysterical. Then the blood-stained cleaver with which the crime was committed and the blood-stained blanket and shawl in which the dismembered trunk was wrapped were suddenly produced before her. The result almost of driving the terror-stricken woman insane. Her condition today is reported as serious.

## STANDARD OIL SUITS. Separate Returns Filed in Missouri Supreme Court.

Jefferson City, Mo., April 11.—In the supreme court today A. D. Eddy and Frank Hagerman filed separate returns of the Standard Oil company and the Republic Oil company in an answer to the ouster proceedings instituted by Atty.-Gen. Hadley on the grounds that the oil companies have formed a trust combination.

The returns deny specifically the allegations in the information filed by Atty.-Gen. Hadley, and then plead that they should not be held to answer to the information, declaring that the anti-trust law is unconstitutional.

The Waters-Pierce Oil company was given until tomorrow to file its returns. The cases are set for April 22, when the pleas will be passed upon and the court will determine whether a commissioner shall be appointed to take testimony.

## RIOT IN MADRID. Much More Serious Than at First Reported.

Paris, April 11.—Dispatches received here through official channels show that the rioting on the Calle San Bernardino, Madrid, yesterday between workmen and police, was much more serious than was at first reported. Troops were sent to assist the police and the soldiers fired on the mob, wounding fifteen men. The rioters stoned windows and otherwise did much damage. The affair grew out of the excitement among the working classes following the loss of life due to the collapse of the reservoir Saturday. The feeling has increased until the populace now is showing a menacing attitude against the government. The latter has decided not to declare a state of siege, but the authorities have taken urgent measures to suppress attempted renewal of the disorders.

## France and the Church.

Paris, April 11.—The chamber of deputies was crowded today when discussion of the sections of the church and state separation bill was opened. Abbe Lamiere began the debate by referring to the argument that separation had been successful in the United States. The speaker contended that France occupied a different position from that of the United States.

Several amendments tending to specify the extent of the religious liberty to be allowed under the bill were withdrawn on the assurance of Minister of Public Instruction Bienvu-Martin that the government intended to permit absolute liberty of conscience. The first sentence of the section of the bill, which declares the "republic assures liberty of conscience," was adopted.

## HUNTER'S HORN HEARD ON HILLS.

President is Enjoying His Hunt More Than Any Single Event in His Life

### WOULDN'T MISS IT FOR \$10,000

Up to Date Twelve Wolves Have Been Caught, and One Big Rattler.

Frederick, Okla., April 11.—The president says he is enjoying his hunt in the big pasture more than any other single event which has happened in his life, and that he would not miss it for \$10,000. Yesterday he witnessed four wolves captured, three of which were taken in by a pack of trained dogs, and the fourth was captured alive by J. R. Abernathy, the famous wolf hunter. At sight of this performance he promised to duplicate the feat. None of the party doubted his courage, but after a red hot chase today when he sprang from his horse and leaped upon the struggling wolf, which was beset by the dogs, the crowd cheered him lustily.

Up to date 12 wolves have been caught. These are all carefully weighed. The president will use this data in writing an article for a magazine.

The president is more than pleased at the manner in which the people of this community are giving him a "square deal" by remaining away from the pasture. He says he may remain here until Saturday, as he appreciates the fairness of the western people.

The president is almost constantly in the lap of the horsemen, as he is furnished the fastest horses in the country. Once today he ran upon a six-foot rattler, which leaped at him four times. He killed this with his 18-inch quirt.

In case the president leaves here before Saturday he says that tomorrow will be the most strenuous day of his life. Ex-Delegate Daniel S. Myron, and Gov. Ferguson will arrive here Wednesday and expect to see the president next day. A banquet will be tendered those gentlemen and a number of others.

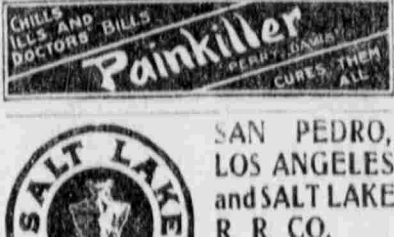

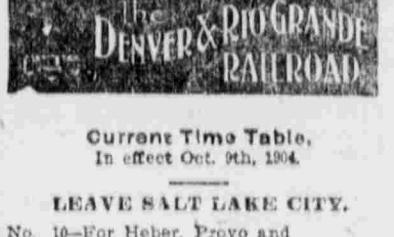
