Pickens, Manager of Palace Livery Thrown from Horse and Killed.

James L. Pickens, manager of the Palace Livery stable, and a highly respected young man of this city, was thrown from his riding horse last evening, receiving injuries about the head which caused his death about three hours later.

Mr. Pickens was riding up Twenty-fifth street about 6 o'clock last evening on his horse, when a runaway horse dashed up the street at great speed, running into Mr. Pickens' horse, knock-ing it down and he fell to the payement, striking on the base of his skull, frac turing it terribly. He was picked up unconscious, and carried into Knoth's drug store, where Dr. Canfield attended him. The ambulance was summoned and the young man removed to the Ogden general hospital, where Dr. Can-field and Dr. Rich made a thorough examination of his injuries, and decided that his condition was too serious to perform an operation immediately, and waited a short time, but he continued to grow weaker until the sad end came. The remains were removed to Larkin & Sons' morgue, where they were em-balmed, and the young man's mother, who resides at Cripple Creek, Colorado, was telephoned the sad information. The deceased was about 29 years of trge. He has resided in Ogden only a

few months, during which time he has been managing the livery stable, for Mr. Clark. He has many friends who will be pained to learn of his demise. ATTEMPTED HOUSEBREAKING.
