

REVOLUTIONARY MOVEMENT IN HINDOSTAN.

A remarkable movement is coming to light in Hindostan. It has been slowly working and increasing in strength since the time of Rammohun Roy, and is apparently destined to work a social and religious revolution in India. The Society is called the Brahmo Somaj, and its aim is the subversion and destruction of caste, to which in a very great measure European rule in India owes its duration. The members of the various castes of India religiously refrain from all associations with any but those of their own class, and hence the people are as completely severed in feeling as if they were of rival nations. The Brahmo Somaj has in view the rending of these fetters, that the masses of India may become united and free, and feel that their interests are identical.

The Society, as may be naturally supposed, in a country where prejudice is so strong, has yet but few members. Its progress is slow, but it is working its way surely. Its principles are taking root in the minds of the thinking portion of the people. The members of the association are looked upon with horror by the holy Brahmins, the highest caste among the Hindoos. He dreads innovation and is a conservative of the first water; and the members of the Brahmo Somaj are heterodox and innovators—the iconoclasts of India, who labor for the destruction of Brahminical corruption and fancied superiority.

The leader of the movement in Calcutta—the Baboo Keshur Chunder, recently lectured in that city on the Association and its aims. He ridiculed faith in and veneration for Shiva, Vishnu, Ganesha, Lakshmi, Parvati, or any of the deities of the Hindoos, and strenuously called his countrymen back to that which he declared was and is the essence of Brahminism—faith in one deity.

"Of all the social and material reforms which India needs he spoke, almost with impetuosity, in comparison with the necessity of turning, by the light of Christ's morality and the path of scientific facts, to the eternal sufficiency and verity of the divine unity. All within this: because one God means one family of Man, and one family leads up to and necessitates brotherly goodwill and social justice, the gradual dying out of caste, of marriages without love, of the seclusion of women, of child marriages and horrid religious tortures, and all the plagues that vex the conscience and spirit of the land. Material benefits would ensue, because Hindoos at last would feel what patriotism, what a common race and a common humanity mean, and they would unite for their just rights. Faith, unbounded faith, glowed in the words of the Baboo as he exclaimed, 'Give me but a dozen men in Bombay, a dozen men in Madras, and there shall be a new caste which will eat up all the castes, and make India one.' India, he declared, would rise into the light of freedom and civilization, and reach her dark past across the world in equal friendship to Europe and to America, regenerated and enlightened with the same belief expressed in other languages."

At a subsequent meeting the Baboo inculcated the necessity of pure, earnest, heartfelt prayer, and while so doing, and proving his position by reading passages from the Sanskrit Shastras, the New Testament, the Zendavesta and Koran he was listened to with reverence by an immense audience of natives.

This is a remarkable movement for caste, ironbound Hindostan, the land par excellence of class-privilege. The land where men of one blood, equal in the sight of the great Creator, are separated by prejudices so strong that death would be endured a thousand times rather than that they should be broken. This movement augurs well for a united India, but will doubtless meet with fearful opposition, and many of its advocates, being innovators and reformers of the most ultra character may yet be rewarded with a bloody crown and be sacrificed while battling for the spread of truth and right.

The same influences that are operating in the west for the overthrow of tradition and time-honored notions and customs are also operating in the East—their most impregnable stronghold. The spirit of God is moving upon the dark waters of ignorance, superstition, class prejudice and pride in every land, and more liberal ideas are being awakened in the minds of all peoples. In China, Japan, the Indies, and in the most priest-ridden countries of Europe long cherished and sacred popular notions are being stamped out of existence before the advancing rays of truth. Let philosophy ascribe this to whatever cause they may, the truth is that God is operating upon the minds of the people, and teaching them the way to truth and liberty. He has with the slavery, ignorance and superstition of the millions, and He is breaking the fetters that ages of priestcraft and kingcraft have forged, and is preparing his creatures in every nation under heaven for the reception of the gospel of His son, and the liberty it bestows. The Kingdom of God has been established; its triumph is certain; and under the banner of that kingdom justice and equal rights will be secured to all, and all men will become brothers.

GENERAL.

PREPARING FOR TROUBLE IN ALASKA.
San Francisco, 24.—The United States flag ship *Pensacola*, Admiral Thayer, proceeds to Victoria, V. I., to-day. The Admiral will confer with the commander of the *Jeuneville*, now lying in Esquimaux harbor, on the affairs of Alaska. The disposition of the Indians and their attitude towards the new population make it a consideration whether the presence of a war vessel is not only a waste of force, but two are not necessary for the safety of the traders.

MINUTE GUNS IN HONOR OF BUCHANAN.
Minute guns were fired to-day, from government vessels in the harbor in honor of the memory of Ex-President Buchanan.

FAREFA ROSA SERENADED.
Farefa Rosa had a warm reception from the musicians of the city last night. A very large concourse of people heard the double serenade given her.

DEATH OF THOMAS HILL.
Thomas Hill, a leading broker and a well known Republican politician, died last evening.

REG. FIRE IN IDAHO.
A dispatch from Boise, Oregon, states that one block in the principal business portion of Idaho City were destroyed by fire on the night of the 18th instant; no particulars. Southern Idaho is now within six days travel of San Francisco.

GALVESTON, 23.—L. E. Progress, of Vera Cruz, says that Caldonimo, who left Campeche with 700 men to fight Indians, was killed and his army destroyed; up to the 16th ultimo only two soldiers are known to have been saved.

INDIAN TROUBLES.
St. Louis, 24.—An arrival from the mouth of the Yellow Stone, says that from there to Benton the Indians are very hostile and had killed many wood choppers and burned nearly all the wood along the river banks. At the mouth of Milk river three wood choppers were rescued from a party of Assinibones. The Indians had attacked their settlement and killed three of the party. At the mouth of the Manjias was a party of Sioux, who had met with a large lot of fine horses. They said another general enabling bill which in the country, kill all the wood choppers in the country and burn all the wood piles and thus keep the boats away.

GOV. HUMPHREYS EJECTED.
Jackson, Miss., 23.—At noon today General Biddle, commander of this post, demanded the surrender of the Governor's office. Gov. Humphreys refused, when Biddle asked if he would have to use force to get possession? To which Humphreys replied that he would. Biddle then brought in a squad of soldiers and took possession. Humphreys has fled up another office and claims to be Governor.

ENABLING BILL.
Chicago, 24.—The *Republican's* special says that Judge Bingham is preparing another general enabling bill, which is to include the names of one or two thousand persons in the South, who participated in the rebellion. Many protests are coming in from the loyal men of the South against the passage of bills so sweeping in character.

ARMY ESTIMATES.
The estimates sent in by Gen. Schofield, to the committee on military affairs, show that the army will be reduced to 29,667 men on the 1st of January next, and on the 1st of July to 17,150.

ACCIDENT.
A terrible accident occurred in north Chicago yesterday. While the workmen were engaged in putting a heavy cornice to a new building, the entire upper portion of the wall gave way, precipitating bricks, mortar and five workmen to the ground, a distance of fifty feet. One man was killed and others badly wounded.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES.
San Francisco, 23.—Democratic primaries, for the election of a new county committee, are being held to-day. Considerable difficulty has occurred in the first ward, and a large police force is in attendance.

THE OVERLAND MONTHLY.
A. Roman & Co., publishers, announce that a magazine, to be called the *Overland Monthly*, will be issued on July 1st in this city.

FOREIGN.
AMERICAN MEDIATION.
London, 23.—Dispatches from Madrid announce the news of the proposed mediation of the United States in the question at issue between Spain, Peru and Chile. It is generally expected in official circles as a practical termination of the war.

SOUTH AMERICAN TROOPS.
Latest advices from South America state that the Spanish Pacific squadron under Admiral Nunes had arrived at Rio Janeiro.

SCOTCH REFORM.
In the Lords this evening the Scotch reform bill passed its second reading.

NEW BISHOPS.
Rome, 23.—A Consistory was held yesterday, at which many new bishops were appointed. The Pope delivered two special allocutions, one concerning the papal bull calling a general council of the Roman Catholic Church, the other on the present state of religion in Austria.

GABRIELI IS PREPARING.
Paris, 24.—La *Liberation* publishes a report that General Gabrieli is raising volunteers to make another attack on Rome.

FRANCE WILL REVEAL ANDRÉ THE
At a public banquet at Villa Vecchia Gen. Dumonte, Commandant of the Volunteers in the *France*, in a speech, declared that France would never abandon the Holy Father.

THE NEW RULER OF SERBIA.
Belgrade, 23.—Milan IV, the new Prince of Serbia, has arrived from Paris; he was received with the greatest enthusiasm.

London, 24.—It is reported that Italy has decided to join to its own contingents abroad, announced that Italy will be strictly neutral in the event of war between France and Prussia.

TRAIN ARRESTED.

London, 23.—George Francis Train was arrested to-day, and brought before the Court of Bankruptcy. He vehemently protested against his arrest and declared that it proceeded from political motives, and appealed to the United States army and navy for protection. He was observed by the spectators. After a brief examination he was remanded to prison.

NEWS FROM HAYTI.

New York, 24.—Haytian advices to the 23d state that Salnave has ordered an exchange of prisoners at Cape Haytien, as he wishes to prevent the population of the capital from revolting. He threatens to bombard the city rather than let the insurgents get possession. He threatens the same thing if any of the foreigners are caught introducing warlike material or stores. Salnave insults all foreigners but Americans, and an English bearer of dispatches was maltreated by him, and afterwards put in prison. Gen. Fanbert attacked Fort Alexander four days ago. Four hundred troops were killed and wounded; among the latter were General Narciso. Salnave refuses all parley and is determined not to relinquish the presidency until he is compelled.

PAPAL ALLOCATION.

London, 24.—The last papal allocation on the state of religion in Austria, declares that Austria should have the concordat which is perpetual in effect; and warns all persons who approve of the laws recently passed by the Reichsrath concerning the press, religious toleration, civil marriage and public education, to beware of the pains and penalties attached to the violation of the sacred rights of the church.

GENERAL AMNESTY.

On the occasion of the delivery of this allocation the Pope announced that he had granted a general pardon and amnesty to those who invaded the States of the church last year, with a few specific exceptions.

DAY OF THANKSGIVING.

Sunday has been appointed a day of thanksgiving throughout Great Britain for the success of the Abyssinian expedition.

REICHSRATH ADJOURNED.

Vienna, 23.—The Reichsrath has adjourned to November 1st. Before adjournment the Prime Minister assured the members that the threats of the bishops would not hinder the rigid enforcement by the Government of the law with regard to the confessional.

REFORMATION ANNIVERSARY.

Worms.—Extensive preparations are being made for the coming celebration of the reformation. All protestant dominions will unite in the celebration. German soldiers, the majority of whom are Americans, arrive in the city by every train.

FARRAGUT AT SOUTHAMPTON.

Southampton, 23.—Farragut's squadron has arrived off Cowes.

STARVATION AT NASSAU.

Nassau, dates to the 29th state business stagnant, failures frequent, and starvation cases frequent.

A Havana letter states that an American brig had been compelled to pay two dollars duty per ton on her cargo, instead of the usual rate of fifty cents. The American Consul had laid the case before the State Department at Washington.

NOVA SCOTIA PETITION NOT GRANTED.

Ottawa, 24.—A reply has been received from the Colonial office to the Nova Scotia appeal for a dissolution of the union with Canada. It represents that the union is the imperial, as well as the provincial policy, and the crown relies on the loyalty of Nova Scotia to support it.

CHINESE.

Hong Kong, May 26, via San Francisco, 24.—The United States steamer *Pensacola*, the flagship of the Asiatic squadron, Admiral Rowan, arrived on the 17th instant. Raw cotton was firm at an advance of one and a half per cent. There was no great demand for breadstuffs on account of the cheapness of rice. Flour was unchanged; wheat was ten cents per bushel cheaper. In other stores and provisions there had been no alteration since the 1st. The tea market has been quiet. Scarcely tea are six weeks higher than last year, and gunpowders two. The Chinese state that the crop of silk will only reach half the yield of last year, owing to unfavorable weather; and they are holding the prices exorbitantly high. Choice teas are \$2.50 per picul. Other musters range from \$1.10 to \$1.20. Opium is inactive. Few papers are quoted at 6.50; old at 9.50 to 9.90. Turkey is in some demand, but out of stock, and for small parcels. Seven to \$1.20 are obtained. Exchange on London for four months four and a half per cent discount. Freight rates are in demand at full prices.

JAPANESE.

Yokohama, June 4, via San Francisco, 24.—The late Tycoon has accepted the conditions of the Mikado, and is to abdicate nearly half of his private territory, disband his army, surrender his navy, and himself retire to Mito, for which place he left on the 12th of May, on foot, as a token of humility. The Tycoon gave orders to his Admiral to surrender the fleet, but that officer left Yedo with all the vessels, and it is uncertain whether he has gone. He is probably somewhere on the northern coast, ready to co-operate with Shogun, who is expected to land with his fleet, and take possession of the Mikado's escape. On the 23d another engagement took place only six miles from Yedo, also ending disastrously to the Mikado. Fourteen hundred men were killed, and 800 captured. A Dal-

mo of the Mikado's household has been made Governor of Fokohama, in place of the old one, a retainer of the Tycoon. The European and American guards round the settlement have been surrounded. The British Minister, Mr. Alcock, presented his credentials to the Government of the Mikado. The High Priest of Kioto has issued a bull warning the Mikado to interfere in no temporal affairs, and calling upon him to assist on pain of being ousted upon by the priesthood to abdicate. One hundred and seventy thousand copies of the proclamation have been sold and distributed among the Japanese.

The *Stone wall* has not yet been surrendered. Her crew have all been paid off, most of them return home in the offing.

The United States frigate, *Idaho*, Lt. Commander Hooker, arrived at Nagasaki, May 18th, two hundred and one days out of New York, all well. The uncle of the Mikado, who has had considerable to do in fomenting the troubles against the Tycoon, was assassinated at Yedo, June 2d. In the matter of the collision between the Pacific mail steamer *Herman*, and the British steamer *Oceola*, the mail company have been assessed fourteen thousand dollars damages and costs. Silk prices rule high: Mybaah and Sinchu extras, 980 to 990; Best, 850 to 870; medium 770 to 800. Inferior 650 to 700. Best 770 to 800; medium 680 to 700; inferior 600 to 630. The stock of tea is small, several small parcels have been taken at high rates. Common to good sixteen to twenty-two medium, twenty-three to twenty-five good, twenty-six to thirty, one to thirty-five; finest, nominal thirty-five dollars and upward per picul. Exchange on London, for four months, four and five and three-fourths pence. The standard value, hereafter, for Boos, as fixed by the government, is three Boos to the dollar, Mexican.
