

Platform Demands National Ownership of Public Utilities and Industries of Nat'l Scope.

CALLS FOR SHORT WORK DAY

Would Abolish Senate and President's Veto Power and Make Constitution Amendable by Majority Vote.

Chicago, May 15,-Eugene V. Debs of Indiana this morning was nominated for president on the first ballot by the Socialist party national convention.

Benjamin Hanford of New York was nominated by the Socialists for vice president

president. Socialist party delegates held the first night session of the convention which has been in progress here since last Sunday and took up tonight the reports of committees on resolutions and plat form. After several hours' debate the platform had not been formally adopt-ed when adjournment was taken until ed when adjournment was taken until tomorrow. The draft of the platform as presented to the convention, how-ever, represented the unanimous views

tomorrow. The draft of the platform as presented to the convention, how-ever, represented the unanimous views of the committee members, and it is believed will be accepted practically in its present shape tomorrow. The demands set forth in it include mational ownership of public utilities and of all great industries of national scope "in which competition has vir-tually ceased to exist." extension of the public domain to include mines, quarries, oil wells, forests and water power, and scientific reforestration of swamp lands. Touching the labor sit-uation, it calls for a shortening of the work day, the securing to workmen of at least a day and a half each week for rest; prohibition of state product of child labor, convict labor and the pro-ducts of uninspected factories. A demand is made for the abolition of the senate and of the veto power of the preisdent, and that the Constitu-ion be made amendable by a majority vote; that all judges be elected by the people for short terms, and that the conver of injunction be curbed by im-mediate legislation. In the preamble to the platform it is charged that capitalists control the dominating parties and through them the elected public officials. trially." In closing, the preamble reads: "In the battle for freedom the So-clalist party does not strive to substi-tute working class rule for capitalist class rule, but to free all humanity from class rule and to realize the in-ternational brotherhood of man."

STREET RY. ACCIDENTS.

N. Y. Public Service Commission Reports 4,707 in April.

New York, May 15.—According to re-ports compiled by the public service commission, there were in April 4,767 accidents upon the street railways, subaccidents upon the street railways, sub-ways and elevated roads within its jurisdiction. This shows a steady in-crease since the beginning of the year. In January there were 3,921 accidents; In February, 3,951, and in March 4,353. Altogether there were 2,386 persons hurt. Of these 1,671 were passengers, 662 per-sons not passengers and 503 employes. These figures also show an increase. Of the persons injured in April 30 died.

CALIFORNIA DELEGATES INSTRUCTED FOR TAFT

Sacramento, Cal, May 15,-The Re-publican state convention, last dight elected four delegates at large, and four alternates, to the national convention at Chicago, instructed the delegates to yote for the nonination of William H. Taft for president, adopted a platform endorsing the policy of President Roosevelt and selected a new state cen-tral committee. George A. Knight, Judge Henry A. Melvin, M. H. De Young and Jacob H. Neff were elected as delegates at large with Char-les Lynch and Charles Wheeler as alternates. The convention adjourned shortly after midnight. In the contest between the regular Re-publican organization and the Lincoin-Roosevelt league, the 'regulars' had no difficulty in securing control of the convention and electing George A. Knight chairman over ex-Mayor W. R. bavis of Oakland, the candidates of the reform faction, by a vote of 351 fo 255, after a sharp fight on the floor. The Lincoin-Roosevelt league people, how-ver succeeded in defeating Gen. Harri-sin Grey Oits, one of the four regular considents for delegate at large, by the victory of the reformers was the cler.

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
