

## GREAT FLIGHT OF ORVILLE WRIGHT

In His Aeroplane He Encircled the Fort Myer Drill Ground Three Separate Times.

START WAS VERY BEAUTIFUL.

Circling Was Superb, the Machine Sailing Like a Bird, Making A Perfect Landing.

Washington, July 1.—Calm and confident, Orville Wright late today, encircled the Fort Myer drill grounds three separate flights. He was cheered by thousands of persons.

Shortly before 6 o'clock the aeroplane was wheeled from its shed to the starting track. Previously the field had been cleared by a troop of cavalry. After the motor had been tested the propellers were cranked and Orville turned on the motor and released the machine.

NEARING STARTING POINT.

As it neared the end of the starting rail, Orville turned up the forward horizontal rudders and the machine arose into the air. It was a beautiful start. Down the field the aeroplane sailed, curved gracefully about the lower end and back up the east side of the field along the edge of Arlington cemetery. The first round was made in 50 seconds. Five times the machine circled the field, attaining a height which varied from 15 to 30 feet.

On the sixth round Mr. Wright came to earth within a few hundred feet of the starting point, completing the flight in exactly five minutes. The landing was perfect, the machine swooping down in successive glides until within a few feet of the earth, when Orville pulled the string which stops his motor and the aeroplane glided smoothly over the grass on its skids until it came to a stop. Again the aeroplane was placed in position on the starting rail, the motor was tested and again the machine encircled the field with ease and grace. Mr. Wright approached dangerously near the starting tower and flew within a few feet of the stables which line the field.

It was noticed that at times the motor skipped out, but this seemed to have no effect on the progress of the aeroplane.

On his second flight Orville made nine rounds of the field in a few seconds less than eight minutes. In a third flight he was in the air a few seconds more than nine minutes and encircled the field nine and a half times. For one complete round he flew very close to the ground evidently preparing to land. This he did within 30 feet of the aeroplane shed. During this last flight he reached a height of 40 feet.

WILBUR TALKS.

After the flight Wilbur said: "We did not make any changes in the motor for today's trial. We only advanced the spark somewhat. We are not using the full power our motor is capable of developing." Mr. Squier expressed the opinion that the rounds of the first flight were approximately half a mile in length. As the machine made these rounds in 50 seconds, it probably was traveling at a speed of from 30 to 35 miles an hour.

CARGOES HURRIED IN TO AVOID NEW TARIFF

Boston, July 2.—Two steamers, bearing rich cargoes rushed to the United States to dodge the high tariff, came into port yesterday. The Leyland line steamship Canadian had in its hold hundreds of bales of Egyptian cotton, cases of rare wines, silks, case goods, machinery, steel, beer, chemicals and general freight. In all it had more than 3,000 tons of merchandise, valued at about \$1,000,000.

The Adelpia of the same line from London, also came up the harbor just ahead of the Leyland. It was filled with cargo, even the meat boxes being used to carry the enormous freight, much of which was rushed here to get ahead of the new tariff.

MICHIGAN FACES FINANCIAL STRINGENCY

Lansing, Mich., July 2.—The state of Michigan faces six months of financial stringency owing to the condition of the state treasury. Only \$300,791 remained in the general fund at the opening of the fiscal year yesterday and during the day \$130,000 of this amount was paid out. The new taxes are not expected to come in before the first of next year and state officials are trying to find some way to bridge over the intervening six months. It is expected that arrangements will be made by some of the state institutions to get their supplies on credit until the first of the year.

BIG CUSTOMS BUSINESS FOR MONTH OF JUNE

New York, July 2.—An improvement in the finances of the customs house at this port is shown in the report of Collector Leeb and indicates that the recent shaking up given his department has been a success. The duties collected on passenger's baggage for June was \$92,381.25, the largest ever paid for that month. Heretofore the

duties on baggage during the month of June have averaged between \$30,000 and \$60,000. The receipts from custom fines, penalties and forfeitures for June, 1909, were \$45,764.89 compared with \$5,466.58 for June 1908. The report shows that custom inspectors are going through the baggage of incoming passengers with a fine tooth comb.

MRS. TAFT RECOVERING.

Washington, July 2.—President Taft is delighted with the progress Mrs. Taft is making toward recovery. For the first time in six weeks the mistress of the White House lunched with the president yesterday and appeared to be quite strong.

Her physicians have promised the president that she will have completely regained her health within the next two months. The president will take his wife to Beverly, Mass., a few days hence and is hopeful that the cooler atmosphere will promote her recovery.

In view of Mrs. Taft's better health, it was announced at the White House that the president will make his Pacific coast trip during the fall.

SIX THOUSAND ACRES OF GRAIN BURNED

Los Angeles, July 2.—Fire swept 6,000 acres of grain yesterday on several ranches near San Fernando, and the loss is estimated at \$125,000. On the Daniel ranch little was saved except the ranch house and barn.

Mexico City, July 2.—Minister Ramuz Segni of Italy questioned here regarding the possible identification of Carmelo Alvaro, or Paolo Demoneo, held here as the slayer of Detective Joseph Petrosino, at Palermo, Sicily, said that he had communicated with the Italian authorities in an effort to determine the identity of the man. He said that he believed that Alvaro escaped from the Italian prison 10 years ago, while serving a sentence.

Minister Segni intimated that requisition papers would soon arrive.

INCREASE IN NUMBER OF MURDERS FOR JUNE

Chicago, July 2.—An increase in the number of murders in June was shown by the monthly report of Coroner Hoffman, given out yesterday. Twenty-four were committed while the average per month is 10 or 12. The suicides for the month number 45.

## DOUBLE POLITICAL ASSASSINATION

At Imperial Institute, London, an Indian Student Murders Gen. Wylie and Dr. Lalacaca.

MAN WAS WALKING ARSENAL.

Assassin a Parsee, About Twenty-five Years Old—His Identification Has Not Been Established.

London, July 1.—A startling double assassination of a political character occurred late tonight towards the conclusion of a public gathering at the Imperial institute. An Indian student whose name is not known, shot and killed Lieut.-Col. Sir William Hutt Curzon Wylie and Dr. Calas Lalacaca of Shanghai.

Wylie, who had held important Indian appointment, fell dead on the spot. Dr. Lalacaca showed signs of life after he fell and was hurried to St. George's hospital, but on arrival there it was found that he was dead.

Those near the assassin seized and held him until the arrival of the police. He had two revolvers, a dagger and a knife. The gathering at the Imperial institute, a building devoted to Indian and other colonial functions, was an "at home" to Indian students. D. W. Thornton, one of the guests, said:

A GUEST'S ACCOUNT.

"At 11 o'clock when the musical program was just concluding, I noticed a middle aged Englishman conversing with a young Indian student, dressed in a dark jacket and wearing a pale blue turban.

"Suddenly the native drew a revolver and fired four shots with the greatest rapidity full at the head of the Englishman. The shots were fired with the muzzle of the weapon close to the victim's face.

"Then came another shot as the Englishman fell and a sixth which struck an elderly Indian gentleman standing a few yards away and who fell, shot in the side.

"I rushed at the assassin and other sprang forward at the same time. We seized him but he struggled, and wrestling one and free, placed the revolver to his forehead and pulled the trigger. It clicked harmlessly, as all the shots had been expended.

"We shouted for doctors and the police. Meantime there was a terrible commotion and the folding doors were finally closed to prevent the people from looking upon the fearful sight.

"At this moment someone exclaimed in a horror-stricken voice, 'Why, it is Curzon Wylie.'

"Then a stately woman in evening dress came up stairs from the cloak room to discover what had happened.

"She then knelt down and as she looked closely at the disfigured face, a look of horror leaped into her eyes and she exclaimed:

"It is my husband; why wasn't I with him."

The victims were placed in ambulances and removed to a hospital. Detectives searched the assassin. Besides two revolvers, a 12-inch dagger was found and a card bearing the name of "Dhiangril." The address was Ledbury Road, Bayswater.

Various papers and letters were also taken from the prisoner.

Indian students attended.

The attack on Sir William occurred on a wide square landing leading to the stair case, which had been used as an overtop smoking room. Sir William and Lady Wylie were just preparing to depart when the former was approached by the Indian student.

Dr. Lalacaca was a Parsee and from evidence it would seem he was shot accidentally.

Lieut.-Col. Sir William Hutt Curzon Wylie was born in 1835, being the youngest son of the late Gen. Sir William Wylie, C. C. B. He was political aide camp to the secretary of state for India since 1901. In 1899 he entered the Indian staff corps and served in Ferozistan during the Afghan war in 1879-89 and accompanied Gen. Sir Roberts' forces to the relief of Kandahar for which service he was decorated.

CONGREGATIONALISTS RAISE THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND

New York, July 2.—The Congregationalists of the United States have just announced the raising of more than \$300,000 of a fund of \$500,000 to liquidate the indebtedness of the American board of foreign missions, the Home Missionary and the American Missionary, the latter working among Indians, negroes and other classes in this country. This practically assures the success of the gigantic undertaking.

Soon after the first of the year when it was learned that these three church organizations owed about \$300,000, it was decided to raise a half million dollars to pay off this debt and create an income-bearing fund. Prominent men took up the matter and meetings have been held in more than 100 cities in the United States. In seeking subscriptions it was stipulated that none should become due until a total of at least \$300,000 has been pledged and that amount had to be subscribed by July 1 or the undertaking would be abandoned.

When the time limit expired, the subscriptions were counted up at the headquarters of the Congregationalist and the announcement is made that they total between \$310,000 and \$315,000. This money will now be collected and the committee will continue to seek subscriptions until the total of \$500,000 has been raised.
