

The citizens of Kansas City, more especially those in-terested in still furthering the live erock interests took hold and helped stock interests, took hold and helped increase the prize fund to above \$20.increase the prize fund to above \$20,-000. Not only this, but the Kansas City Stock Yards company erected a new sale pavilion at a cost of \$50,000 that is pronounced by those acquainted with similar buildings to be the best of its kind in the world in which to exhibit live stock and hold public sales. The next coming great event in live stock-circles will be the show and sale at Chicago during the first week in December. All the principal beef breeds will make an exhibit and four-of them, the Shorthorns, Herefords. of them, the Shorthorns, Herefords, Aberdeen-Angus and Galloways, will hold public sales. 
