DIED. At her residence in Lake City, on May 27, 1878, ELIZABETH BUSHMAN, aged 75 years and 9 months. She was born in Switzer land, and emigrated to the United States in her fourteenth year. She died of the small pox, and was buried in the Salt Lake City cemetery on June 1st, 1878, where she lived until her death.

AN ORDINANCE In Relation to the Inspection of Buildings. SECTION 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City: That the Inspector of Buildings, before entering upon the duties of his office, shall take and subscribe an oath of office, and file bonds, with approved securities, in the sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of said office, which bonds shall be approved by the Mayor and filed in the office of the Recorder.

SECTION 2.—It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Buildings, when called upon, to examine all public or private buildings, bridges, dams, locks, gates, reservoirs, aqueducts, or other public works, and certify as to the strength, safety, workmanship and general condition of the same. He shall, when requested, inspect all building material which may be offered for sale, measure all buildings, building material, masonry and other mechanical work, and when required, certify to the measurement thereof, which certificate shall be evidence of the things therein certified to.

SECTION 3.—Should the Inspector require the removal, or prevent the construction of any fire-place, chimney, stove, or pipe in any building which may be dangerous to life or property, and may direct the construction of safe places of deposit for ashes, and shall see that all ordinances in relation to the strength and safety of public buildings are carried into effect.

SECTION 4.—It is hereby made the duty of every person, corporation or association, to erect any public building within the limits of this city, to notify the Inspector of Buildings at least three days before commencing the same, and within the five limits, every person, corporation, or association before proceeding to erect any kind of building, or to repair, or alter any building already erected, shall notify the Inspector, and all such building, repairs and alterations shall be subject to his inspection, and for all service he shall be paid a reasonable compensation, at a rate not to exceed fifty cents per hour, by the parties requiring such service, or in behalf of whose property the same shall be rendered.

SECTION 5.—Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or to the written requirements of the Inspector of Buildings, consistent therewith, shall be liable for each offense to a fine in any sum not to exceed ninety-nine dollars, or imprisonment not to exceed thirty days or both.

SECTION 6.—All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
