Absalom Pennington Free, the first of 10 children of Andrew Free and Mary Pennington, was born in the state of North Carolina, March 22, 1798, and died July 23, 1882.

He was the father of 21 children; grandfather of 90 children; and second great-grandfather of 139 children, and second great-grandfather of 26 children. These total 276, and with sons and daughters-in-law, 359, of whom 266 are living and 93 are dead.
