The drafts in circulation here-tofore were only preliminary, which accounts for the failure of the com-mittee to make them public. If can be stated authoritatively that the amendment will apply to all cor-porations, without regard to their cap-ital stock. It is likely, however, that the tax will apply only to earnings in excess of \$5,000 a year. This will re-move the burden from small corpora-tions without subjecting the measure to constitutional objections by reason of the exemptations.
