

CORPORATION EARNINGS TAX

Pres. Taft and Republican Members of Senate Finance Committee Confer on Matter.

ALL OF THEM FAVORED IT.

Plan Adopted for Submitting to States Question of Amending the Constitution.

Washington, June 20.—President Taft, entertained at dinner tonight the Republican members of the senate finance committee and Senator Root, and there followed a conference on the proposed tax on the net earnings of corporations.

On account of the absence of Secy. Knox and Atty.-Gen. Wickersham, little was accomplished beyond a general discussion. This left no doubt that the president and the senate leaders are in absolute harmony and entirely favor the corporation earnings tax.

Mr. Wickersham will meet with the president, Mr. Knox and Mr. Root tomorrow. The proposed amendment will then be drafted and sent to Senator Aldrich for presentation to the senate. The drafts in circulation heretofore were only preliminary, which accounts for the failure of the committee to make them public. It can be stated authoritatively that the amendment will apply to all corporations, without regard to their capital stock. It is likely, however, that the tax will apply only to earnings in excess of \$5,000 a year. This will remove the burden from small corporations without subjecting the measure to constitutional objections by reason of the exemptions. This provision was worked out by members of the finance committee today and was explained to President Taft. The latter

recognized the wisdom of the suggestion and said if it strikes the attorney general and secretary of state favorably, the amendment will be drawn accordingly.

Another important feature related to the interest on bonds of corporations. The consensus of opinion was that the tax should not apply to such interests for the reason that in many cases it would amount to double taxation. Particularly would this be true of savings banks which hold the bonds of corporations. At the same time the senators told President Taft that it would be necessary to find some way to prevent corporations from manipulating their stocks and bonds so as to evade the tax on earnings. President Taft said precautions should be taken to make it impossible to avoid payment of the tax by corporations.

Senator Aldrich told the president a 3 per cent tax on the earnings of corporations would produce about \$40,000,000 revenue annually. What would be lost by the proposed exemption of \$5,000 for each corporation could not be stated. It has been the thought of the administration to have enacted a measure that would raise about \$20,000,000 or \$25,000,000 a year, and Mr. Aldrich believed this would be the result if the exemption suggested was made.

Several senators who attended the dinner stated tonight that the administration plan for an amendment providing for a tax on earnings of corporations and submitted to the states the question of amending the Constitution so as to authorize Congress to levy a tax on incomes would be adopted.

The review will be the most imposing naval pageant ever seen in British waters. The date selected coincides with the projected visit of the emperor of Russia to France and England. Therefore, some Russian men of war are likely to be in the vicinity, and undoubtedly the emperor will be a spectator.

PRECAUTION TAKEN AGAINST GRAFTERS

Refreshment Committee of G. A. R. Encampment Will Be Provided With Credentials.

As a precaution to "head off" grafters in the matter of collections to be solicited for providing funds with which to purchase refreshments for the veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic in the parade during the encampment week, the committee on refreshments at its meeting Saturday, decided to adopt the following form of credentials, to be shown by all who solicit funds for this purpose: "This is to certify that M. . . . has been assigned to the . . . district with the approval of Colonel F. M. Sterrett, executive director, and the executive committee of the Women's Citizens' committee of the forty-third national encampment G. A. R., to collect money for the purpose of buying refreshments for the free lunch to be served along the line of march during the big parade on Wednesday, Aug. 11. No money is to be received by others than those so authorized." This note is signed by Colonel F. M. Sterrett and Mrs. W. H. Jones, of the Woman's Citizens' committee.

An idea in the way of assisting the committee to provide drinking cups for the veterans has been suggested by a member of the Women's Citizens' committee. "We will need about 10,000 tin cups, said this member, and the best price we have been able to get so far is nearly two cents each. Last year the merchants of Toledo provided cups at one cent each, and they were painted red white and blue. It seems to me the merchants might add to the painting their advertisement on the side or bottom of the cup, and every veteran would read it every time he drank a cup of water."

WANT BIG AREA RESTORED.
Provo Citizens Seek to Have Order of 1895 Rescinded.

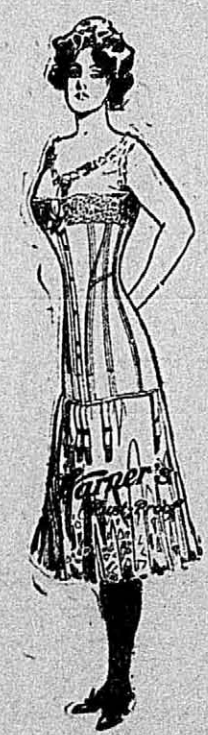
