

TELEGRAPHIC. MORE COMPROMISE.

Propositions Agreed to in Cabinet
Meeting Yesterday.

TO BE OFFERED TO THE SENATE.

The College of Seigniorage, Purchase
of Silver and Issue of Bonds the
Chief Features.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—At the earliest meeting today, after a complete discussion of all phases of the Senate situation, a compromise proposition was agreed to, to be offered by one of the repeat members. It includes all the Harris amendment, a provision for the exchange of silver signatures, in the treasury amounting to \$25,000, and includes the purchase of silver bonds, which will until the next session be purchased. This will carry the purchase of silver over the expiration of Mr. Cleveland's term, assuring that the silver money will remain, and relieve the treasury during the exchange of the signatures. It also includes the little purchase of bullion, besides making the nation as coined available treasure assets.

To meet the demands of the East, just now, the issue of one hundred million dollars of 5 percent bonds is included. There is still a question whether a provision for the repeal of the tax on state banks and the redemption of notes of all classes below shall be added.

DEMOCRATIC SUPPORT AGREED.

The Democratic senators have been holding a conference all day, and have it is stated upon their authority, come to an agreement, an adjustment. It continues the Sherman act in effect eighteen months and provides for a limited bond issue. Some silver Democrats and the silver Republicans are making a vigorous protest against this amendment and may be able to change it.

THE RAILROAD HORROR.

Plaint: Bremen—Cause at the District Court.

JACKSON, Mich., Oct. 13.—When the collision occurred the bricks that rent the air could be heard for blocks. Elias Joseph Kimberling jumped from his car, joined the crash and was uninjured. John Whalen, who was driving with a child at her breast, a woman whose name is unknown lay on the side of the track suffering untold mental and physical agony. Her husband, a small child two years old, and injured, the child died. Anxieties and fears were expressed about the condition of the child. He may not recover. As the mangled forms were carefully removed from the coaches the number of fatalities increased in sympathy and the injured cried out in agony.

"Lord have mercy on my soul," shrieked one poor fellow whose life was snatched away, "Good Jesus, save us." The work of removing the dead and injured was carried on with all possible dispatch. Mayor Benfield and Russell Peck took charge of the work of the dead people and to them and the survivors of the accident fell the burden of the attention bestowed upon the sufferers. Though a thousand opinions were scattered about this morning, but few remain in the ground tonight. They have been carried away by the undertakers, embalmed and prepared for the funeral. Hundreds perished with the blood of the killed boys born to others who carried away likewise. The cause of the accident is a mystery. Some of the railroad officials say the engine was too fast. Others say the Whalen, but none of them say he can be fairly held responsible for it. The railroads would not work, and nobody seems competent to explain why they would not.

The two trains were delivered to the Michigan Central at Buffalo, one from the New York Central, and the other from the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western. Both cars were examined, the bodies having been picked up at least points in New York and Pennsylvania.

Engines Whalen was able to talk to a representative of the Associated Press. He said the engine was a new one and in all respects had worked beautifully on the run from Detroit. He stopped at the points and slowed down at one juncture, and on these three occasions the engine was held by the hand of Jackson J. Moore, a man who when the disaster occurred, he touched the air and found it right. As the train crossed Elmwood avenue he began to slow down and applied the brakes. His hands were on the engine, and he had no time to stop the engine. The engine had stopped for a few moments, and then started again, and probably would have been a repetition of the previous.

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One of the most popular of the moment was the disappearance of Mrs. H. G. Gibbs, who was accompanied by her husband, who was out on the platform at the time of the accident. She has been missing ever since. Her husband is one of the ablest attorneys in the west, but did not receive her remains when taken out. He made a trip through the different understanding establishments himself, and was forced to find his wife's body buried.
