AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE erection and maintenance of water clos-ets, out-houses and privies within forty (40) 'feet of any street line. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect or raintain any water closet, out-house or privy within forty (40) feet of the line of any street in Salt Lake City; provided that this ordinance shall not apply to any water closet existing or to be hereafter erected or maintained in any dwelling, store, factory, shop or office building, where the same is or shall be properly constructed, with vent pipes passing through the roof of the building, and con-nected with the sewer or cesspool. Section 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and up-on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not less than rive (85,00) dollars, nor more than three (3) months, or by both such fine and impris-oment. Special Correspondence.

Colonia Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, Sept. 27 .- The following extracts from pendence day at the capital:

"Mexico, Sept. 18 .- I came up last Monday to see the sixteenth celebra-tion, also to do a little record work. Sister Saville and Autoine President Ivin's son), came down to Cuernavaca last Saturday and we spent Sunday there, and all came up together.
