Our duty as parents to those whom God has given us charge of, is clearly specified in the revelations. If we teach not our chil-dren to serve God and avoid evil, the sins of the children will rest upon the parents to the extent of the parental neglect. I also hold that there is an im-perative obligation upon us as a com-munity to see that a generation of Saints are reared unto the Lord. We need not movin over split milk, hut we can take care of the future. If the species of education defined by our brother who preceded me had hereto-fore existed we would not have had to mourn over our children to that extent that we do. In this respect we have somewhat failed, the proof of the omission being that we are now 'trying to make a decent commencement. I find no fault with anybody, but take my own part of the blame as a member of the community. The gook of Mormon tells of class distinctions and pride among the an-clent Nephites on this continent. We have some of those social plasses, amongst us. There was another phase of class distinction among the Ne-phites. Those who could through their wealth obtain learning advanced in-tellectually beyond those who did not possess similar facilities. There is danger of similar conditions among us. I hope to see the day when adequate facilities of the people of God will not; only heaple to graduate as rise schol. iacilities of this hature will be within; the reach of the poor, and when the children of the people of God will not only be able to graduate as ripe schol-ars, but also as full-grown Latter-day; Sants.
