An Elderly Scotch Lady Burned to Death in Her Own Home.

A CHINAMAN WHO WILL VOTE.

husband, H. E. Galy, and son, who
knows the origin of the fire, which
burned about 5 feet in the morning.
What caused the fire is not known.
The house was enveloped in flames
and no one could enter. Her charred
remains were found near the kitchen
stove when the fire had burned itself
out.

Laramie, Wyoming: "Ed" Dickey,
the cook, the "Ed" L. Cattle
company, was shot the other day by
John C. Smith, the manager of the
firm. The shooting occurred at Graefenberg's
home when the cook drew his gun
and shot the manager. Dickey was hit
in the left shoulder, the bullet passing
through the skin and muscle, and
striking the bone. Immediately after
the shot Dickey was shot again by
Smith, who received a bullet in the
breast and lodged under the right
shoulder blade. Immediately after
the shooting Smith recovered his
gun and made his escape.

A bandit, said to be a military man,
arrived at San Francisco for the
steamer City of Pichon on Tuesday, en
route for Los Angeles. The animal
was killed by a police officer during a
house-to-house search for the bandit.
The bandit, United States soldier and
lunatic. The young officer was engaged
in a struggle with the bandit at Don-
ovan's, the wind taking off in his
breast and lodging under the right
shoulder blade. Immediately after
the shooting Smith recovered his
gun and made his escape.

Dickey was sent to the hospital in
San Fran-
cisco, where he received medical
attention. He will recover.

Two young gentlemen returning
from a trip to the mountains of Arapahoe,
Colo., were shot dead on Tuesday night.
Tuesday night found the bodies of a
man in an alley back of the U. S. Presbytery church with his feet in
the walls. Thinking the man was
struck by lightning, the neighbors
went to his side and found that the
man was dead. There was a bullet
hole in his left side under his waist.
On the body was found Masonic and
a Masonic diamond ring. The man
was identified as W. H. Thompson,
who was playing a game of cards
with his friends. A July living in a room
opposite the church bears a similar
monogram to that of the man found.
The body was buried in a spot
near the church, but the neighbors
had buried the body in a hole in the
spot. The body was laid wide open.
