LETTER FROM LAIE.

Ice Cream Under Difficulties—Mis-
adventure, Etc.

LAIE, AUG. 4th, 1887.

Editor Deseret News:

The summer brings us clearer skies
and a few degrees rise in the mercury.
But for these two trifles, one would
never be able to distinguish summer
from winter.

We had a very good garden set out
some time ago, but the floods came
from heaven and beat upon it, the
winds blew and the sun dried up the
dews, until at last, a few cucumbers
seem to be the only reliable representa-
tives of our fond hopes. A melon patch
set out by President King turned out
better, although the California oxen
and the natives' light fingers quietly
disposed of about two-thirds of them.
And so now we go back again to 'pot'
for our variety.

I suppose all your readers fancy we
are in the habit of stirring them up
to really outside of what we read in
the papers, we would never know any
thing was going on in Honolulu at all.
The lethargic native mind is just be-
ginning to awake to the fact that he is
practically ousted from all sorts of
business by the white man. He is a
machine, in short, out of which
taxes may be wrung, but he is not
discussed, if a few happen
to gather in a convenient spot. But
hardly enough interest (hear at Laie at
last) is excited to test the waters of
their lazy homes. Everything is com-
paratively quiet in town, although the
strains seem to be very much in
earnest.

THE LATEST NEWS

I can think of it that pine apples can
be purchased in a garden this side of
the water, and still have them
furthermore, ice can be had delivered
on the beach at Laie, for about
two cents a pound. We had a hun-
dred pounds sent here the other day,
and then, like the little boy whose eyes
always circled around his digestive
tract, we were made to wait. Then to
freeze! Aye, there was a rascal! Two
buckets were inserted in an old tub,
which leaked all the water out as fast
as the ice melted. We were under-
verred to fill up the buckets inter-
twined with racks in order to save the ice,
and then set a few of our most valued
brethren to turning those pails back
and forth, back and forth. No one
with any sensibility would have
greeted the pailful dollar and a half
paid out in ice for the sake of the
amusement afforded by the thing.

of Laie. Even the white babies were
persistent in their efforts to observe
their fathers employed in useful labor,
and some one was constantly busy
ordering the things out of the porch into
the quiet obscurity of an inner room.

From two to three hours consumed
in the manner and a unanimous vote
declared the stuff frozen as much as
time, muscle and ice would permit. In
fact, it was soon ascertained that the
cream was doubling on us, so to speak,
and coming back to its original state.
Accordingly all hands and the ladies
gathered round the table, spoons and
dishes rattled, the slushy mush was
ladled out, and we endeavored to
fancy ourselves.

and cake. The cake, unlike the ice-
cream, was a success. When we closed
up accounts that night, we still had
one bucket of cold cream, which
afterwards assisted in the composition
of a rice pudding. I believe
Managers have come and gone, like a
beautiful dream. Likewise, oases.
The mill work is all done or this
season, and several of the brethren
are now engaged in putting up a ware-
house on the beach at Laie. The
building is a corrugated iron shed,
it is to hold the sugar, which will be
hailed there in milling time by the
wagons just purchased, and stored away
by day, thus doing away with the
very inconvenient method of
putting down work in the mill for a
day, and men and swarms of ox teams
being set to haul sugar to the beach,
while the waiters for the cargo, and
little landing will also be put out into
the water to pile sacks on and prevent
their becoming wet in the surf as they
are loaded in the boat.

**I understand President King in-
tends building a new blacksmith shop
(a thing sadly needed for storage of
tools and blacksmith work) near the
site of the old one, just as soon as the
warehouse is up.**

There is a very good, quiet, peaceful
spirit here, and

some of our number will be leaving us
this fall, but even then, the work will
be a few of us left. We had a very
spirited celebration of the Twenty-

Bro. Y. & M. I. A. A very nice
feast, and excellent meeting were fol-
lowed by amusements in the afternoon.
All felt well and repaid for their

NORTHERN NOTES.

**Bear Lake Stake Tabernacle—Pain-
ful Accident, Etc.**

Ernest S. Penrose furnishes the fol-
lowing items, in a communication
dated Montpelier, Idaho, September
1st:

Editor Deseret News:

The Bear Lake Stake Tabernacle is
nearing completion. The walls are up
to the square, the gables are finished,
the carpenters are busily engaged
putting up the galleries and roof.
About half of the rock used in the
building is a red sand stone, hauled
from Indian Creek Cañon, about 15
miles southeast of Paris. It will be
the finest building of the kind north of
Salt Lake City. All of the rock work
will be finished in about two weeks.
The dimensions of the building are
320 feet; the walls are 30 feet from
the base to the square, with a semi-
circular vestry 34 feet high. The
upper part will be used by the choir. The
entire tower will be 75 feet high. The
basement is arranged so that it can be
used to heat the building by steam
or hot air. The building when com-
pleted will accommodate about 3,000
people. President Dodge and others
of the building committee have been
very energetic in pushing the work
forward.

Brother Thomas Passey has just put
up a new building and started a cream-
ery in conjunction with his dairy
where he makes a very fine article of
butter, producing an average of 800
pounds a week, for which he has a
ready market along the O. S. L. Rail-
way.

Brother James M. Holmes, of Mont-
pelier, met with a painful accident a
few days ago, while he was stacking
hay. He had just finished the load and
was about to do the same on the next
rack and was taking the load hay from
the sides of the stack, when the rack
frame gave way throwing him on a
sharp stake which pierced his thigh to
the depth of about five inches, cutting
down his leg and forcing a large
piece of cloth into the wound, which is
very painful. It was a difficult
task for him to extricate himself from
the position in which he fell. He is
getting along very well, although the
wound pains him when moving around.
The weather was very cold and frosty

in the mountains.
