

PROSELYTING IN BERLIN.

The last issue of the Millennium Star contains a letter from Elder Joseph A. Smith written from Berlin Aug. 5, 1885, from which we make the following extracts:

"The German publications are full of remarks about us. You know we have been leading a very secluded life here in Berlin, shunning publicity and keeping in the dark corners, as though we had no rights whatever. I found, on examining the German religious laws, that we are entitled to protection, as well as other denominations, and so determined to bring our doctrines before the public and let them hear our side. Three-fourths of the City of Berlin did not know that 'Mormons' were in their midst, and fully one half had never heard of them as being in existence. I wrote a pamphlet and had a thousand printed, and then placarded the city, announcing a 'Mormon' meeting and a sermon upon the 'Mormon belief.' Fully five hundred persons visited the hall, and it was as though a bombshell had been dropped in their midst. The remarks were loudly applauded, although there were some opposing voices. But the result has been wonderful. All the newspapers made their remarks upon us and advertised our place of meeting, which has been, since then, crowded with strangers. Five have been baptized since the meeting, which is more than has been done in the last ten months; and the prospects are good for a large harvest, as the meetings continue to be thronged. I thought of holding another large meeting in a day or two in the centre of the city, for I am certain much good can be accomplished that way. But a little difficulty has arisen in connection with a circular which we distributed in meeting, and we may, perhaps, have to pay a five mark fine (about five shillings) for leaving out a name. It was done unknowingly. The prospects are good for a great work here, and at no time have I felt so hopeful or so repaid for my labors. But whoever comes to take charge here must act wisely and discreetly. Berlin should have the best representation we can give, for this is a chief point in the Empire. All lights and all privilege go out from Berlin. It will pain me to leave here, now affairs are beginning to ripen, but one sows and the other reaps, and we all get our reward. My reward is in the consciousness I have of doing my best at all times."

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Big Bear was tried at Regina yesterday on the charge of treason and felony, and found guilty. Sentence was deferred.

It is reported that the boiler of the Spanish cruiser Castella at Cadiz, has exploded. The Castella is the largest cruiser in the Spanish navy.

Lieutenant Davis, in command of the 300 scouts stationed at El Paso, Texas, awaiting orders, has been instructed to proceed to Fort Bowie, Arizona, immediately.

General De Courcey, the French commander in Anam, having asked for authority to depose the youthful King of Anam if he thinks necessary to do so, has been granted the fullest liberty of action.

A Lima dispatch says: A steamer arrived here yesterday from the south. She brings the news that Ica, which is occupied by the government troops and volunteers, still holds out. Caceros' forces have been obliged to abandon their advanced positions at Canta owing to want of provisions.

A New Orleans dispatch says: Ensign F. C. Rider, assistant engineer on the United States man-of-war Swatara, committed suicide in his bunk on board of that vessel this afternoon, by shooting himself in the head. No cause is assigned for the act.

Winslow D. Morgan, a fugitive from justice in Montana, has been arrested at Victoria, B. C., on a steamer. He killed F. B. Haining, at Beaverhead, Montana, on July 5th last. The murderer says he killed his victim because he was to intimate with his (Morgan's) wife.

LIGHTNER.—At Minersville, Utah, August 29th, 1885, of consumption, Adam Lightner, aged 75 years, 4 months and 16 days. He has been among the Latter-day Saints for 50 years, though not a member of the Church; he made no profession of religion, but believed in doing to others as he would like to be done by. When Zion's Camp went up to Missouri he belonged to a company called the "Liberty Blues;" this company was called to guard Joseph, Hyrum and the twelve to Jackson County and back. He opened the first store in Far West; was of great assistance to the people in their troubles in that place, and risked his life in trying to aid them. When the troops came against Far West the Governor gave orders for Mr. Lightner and his brother-in-law, Mr. Cleminson, with their families to be allowed to leave there before sacking the town. A flag of truce was sent for them and they and their wives went out of the town to meet Colonel Pomeroy, who begged them to go. Mrs. Lightner asked if he would let all the women and children go, and he refused. She then ask-

ed if he would let her brothers and sisters go. He said no, it was against orders. Mr. Lightner returned to Far West, and not until the Prophet Joseph and others were taken prisoners would he leave, and when he did so he lost all his property in that place.—COM. St. Paul Pioneer Press please copy.
