

Newburyport, Mass., has passed an ordinance forbidding organ-grinders to play longer than ten minutes on any one block.

A Texas meat company has been formed for the purpose of manufacturing preserved meats and meat extracts. Thousands of bullocks are utilized annually for the export trade without affecting the price of stock in Texas, since there are about ten million head of cattle in the State. The natural increase in the present herds supplies more animals than can be utilized profitably by any process heretofore in use for preserving and transporting meat.

The Washington correspondent of the Indianapolis Journal says:

"I do not know if it is something in the air, but there is a society manner here that is in wretched taste when put on by young girls. It is not exactly a simper or a smirk, with a mincing voice and walk, but an affectation of maturity and graciousness that amounts to abandon and effrontery. So far as our city is concerned, something must be done for the protection of wayfarers, or every man must go into the streets prepared to defend himself against violent assault."

The Harrisburg correspondent of the Pittsburg Commercial makes the following announcement:

"The Governor has signed the bill, which passed both houses a few days ago, repealing the third section of the supplement to the law regulating boroughs, passed in 1871, known as Buckalew's cumulative voting section, so that that abortion is promptly put out of the way. When this law was passed in 1871 many Republicans were deceived into voting for it by its plausibility, but one year's experience under it satisfied men of all parties of its mischievousness and impracticability. The repealing bill was originally introduced into the House to apply to a single borough that had been bothered nearly to death by the attempt to put the Buckalew idea into operation, but so general was the feeling of disgust at it throughout the State that the House promptly and unanimously changed it into a general law, and the Senate as unanimously concurred in it. Party feelings and interests had nothing to do with the repeal. All the leading Democrats were out-spoken in deprecating the further continuance of the law."

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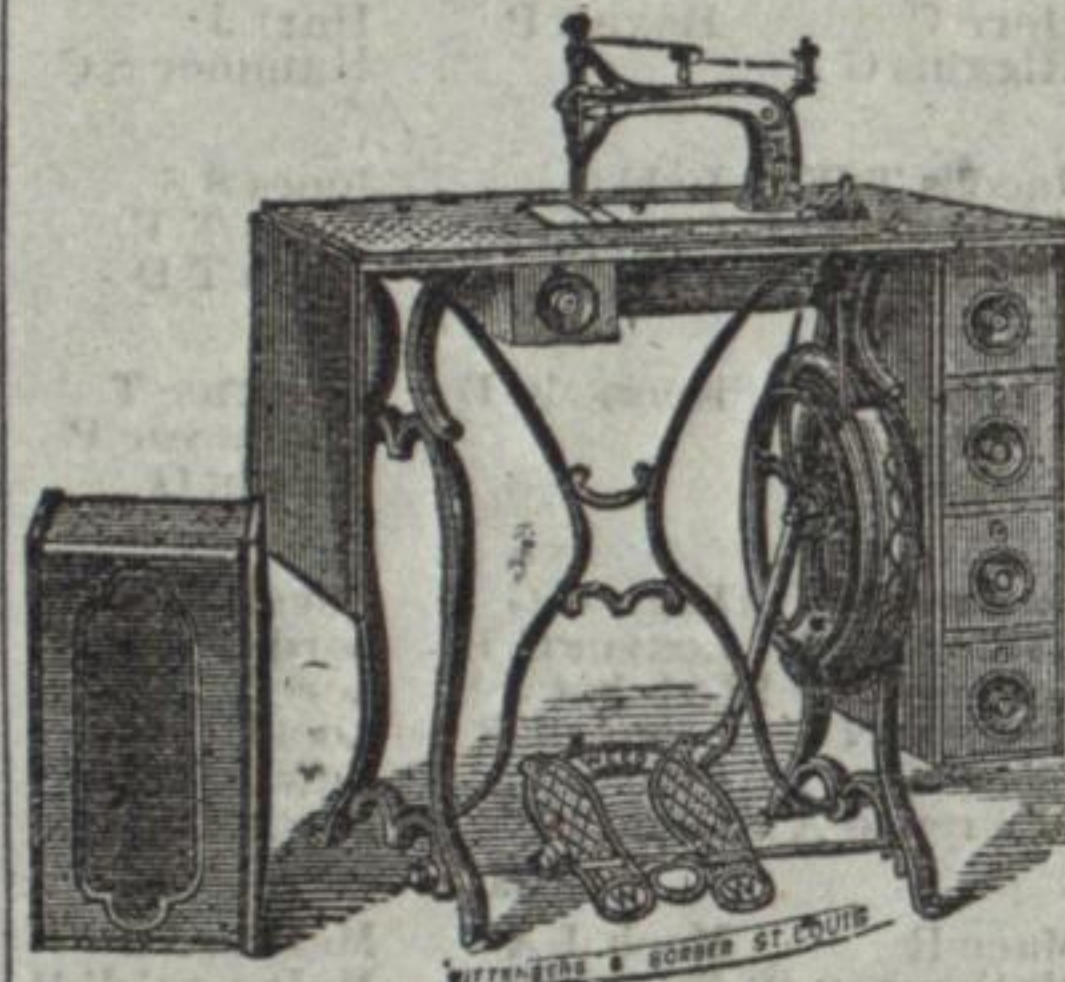
