SCHOOL3 CLOSE ON MAY 11. Deficiency in Funds Cuts Off Three Weeks of School.

Small Balance on Hand Will be Used

#### to Run the High .. chool and Eighth Grade Classes Till June 1.

The public schools of Salt Lake will close on Friday, May 11th, just three weeks before the regular time of closing. This was made necessary by the lack of funds, but it is probable that the High School and the eighth grade classes will continue to the end of the year, to make room for those coming after them, to avoid a congestion next year, and to keep the graduations regular

A statement of the revenues and expenditures prepared by Clerk Moreton, shows that \$300,772.35 have been received to date, and \$12,191.85 will be received from now till June 30th. The appropriations for the schools have so far amounted to \$238,418.76, leaving \$71,-

277.89 to pay on May 11th. Deducting the total expenditures, \$309.696.75 from the total revenues would leave a bal-atice of \$3,267.45 on May 11th, a sum that would defray the expenses of the schools for about two days and a half. The reason for the deficiency is and iributed to two causes, first that the county assessor and the county treas-urer failed to levy ar adequate tax, and second the increased attendance of pupils has enhanced the school expenses materially. materially. All the teachers will this week re

ceive a written notice to the effect that the schools will close on May 11th. This will be done in order to protect the board for liability for breach of contract. Regarding the balance of \$3.267.45 Su-

perintendent Cooper proposed that it be used for the continuing of the High School and the eighth grades, that the School and the eighth grades, that the graduating pupils may be able to com-plete their course and make room for the lower grades, who could, thought Mr. Cooper, make un for the lost time next year, but the High School and eighth grade students could nover make up for lost time. While there seemed to be a general feeling favoring the proposition of Su-perintendent Cooper there was no vote taken, it being deferred until this evening.
