

FOREIGN.

PARLIAMENT MEETS.
LONDON, 12.—Parliament opened yesterday. Large crowds congregated in the vicinity of the Parliament House, long before the session began, and when Bradshaw and Gladstone arrived, they were loudly cheered. The vaults of the House of Parliament were filled with a dense crowd, but no indications of the Guy Fawkes plot were discovered. The right Hon. Arthur Wellesley Pease was chosen chairman of the House of Commons without opposition.

The Telegraph says:—The conference of the Parlemente members of Parliament Dublin yesterday was a farce. There was no popular demonstration in the streets. The absence of Mr. Parnell from the meeting was a lucky accident as he was thus saved the necessity of being compelled to defend his Parliamentary programme. The members of the Irish party privately agreed that the best policy to pursue was to go into the time and most active of their constituents by preparing some rules.

DYING.

MR. HANFORD RETIRING.

PARS, 12.—A dispatch from Rio de Janeiro states that 900 convicts in that city have been freed during the session of the prison. They have protected barricades and otherwise protected themselves for defensive operations. Troops have been ordered to Rio to quell the disturbance, which has been increased by the rebels in order to gain time for the military to arrive.

FIFTEEN DEATHS IN FIRE.

A Spanish mill at Alcalá la Real was destroyed by fire, and 15 persons perished in the flames.

CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council met in regular session at 7 o'clock last evening, Mayor Sharp presiding.

A communication was received from the City Council tendering the freedom of the city to Bishop William Brown. It being fast day, the surprise was made complete.

CHIEF ENGINEER G. M. OTTINGER.

Chief Engineer G. M. Ottinger of the Fire Department presented his annual report to the Board of Fire Commissioners. The report shows thirty-three arrests, to have been secured. Total losses, \$19,500; insurance, \$11,000. Referred to the Fire Department.

City District Engineer presented his list of expenses in his department for the month of December, to the value of \$482.80. Referred to the Committee on Police.

Committee on Police referred to the list of arrests made during the year 1885, with the offense for which the arrests were made.

The total amount of property reported stolen was \$9,518.30; total amount recovered, \$3,671.

The report was ordered that the Fire Department be thanked for its work.

The tables were removed and the people seated for a short time to listen to appropriate speeches, songs, &c.

Counselor Edwin Pace, in behalf of the members of the ward, with a few well-chosen remarks, presented the Biscuit Fund.

The committees on waterworks reported favorably on the request of Z. Watson, asking the Board to remove his property on Fifth East Street, but to be removed; the committee recommended that the cause around hydrants in future be made of brick or stone, instead of wood.

The committee on streets and alleys reported that they had examined and found correct the quarterly reports of the city engineer.

The committee on streets and alleys reported favorably on the petition of E. Mitchell and others, asking that Sixth Street be graded and the sidewalks removed; and that a fourth street be built across the canal at that point, also out the canal to the sidewalk and others, asking that Second Street, between First and Second East, be graded and repaired.

The committee on improvements reported favorably on the petition of Wm. B. Barton and others, asking for the erection of gas lamps on First Street, and recommended that four lamps be placed on each side of the canal, three on the east and one on the west.

The committee on waterworks recommended that two lamps be placed on East Temple Street, between North Temple and First Streets, to be adopted.

The petition of F. M. Foy for franchise was granted to Mrs. Barton's husband, F. B. Foy, a small merchant.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom had been referred the petition of Salt Lake City Fort Douglas, asked that the canal be removed from the intersection of Ninth Street and Seventh East Streets, southward, recommended that the prayer be not granted.

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
