TRIP TO EUROPE.

This is Promised White Sox if They Win Pennant.

The White Sox, when not employed in practice or in a schedule game, have two topics of conversation. These are the promise made to them by President Comiskey of a trip to Europe if they won the American League pennant this year, and the program for Flag Raising day, May 14, when the world's championship pennant will be thrown to the wind.

The flag raising promises to be all to the merry. The national commission is going to provide a band of 100 musicians to tent before and after the pennant is hoisted, and to play the big polka that pennant is going to be some pennant, too. The commission has blown in \$250 for the flag. It is going to be of like size, forty feet long and double thickness in order to bear these words on both sides: "Chicago White Club, Champions of the World, 1906."

There is room on the ball field for all of the musicians, 1,000 around the field ahead of the world-beaters and the Washingtons, who will be the opposing team on that gala occasion. Although the top players of the world will be bleachers, some extra long ropes will be procured and the flag pulled up by the players from inside the field. President Comiskey has not made up his mind yet what to do with the pennant when it is down, but a feature of Flag day or not.

Before going to Detroit the Old Roman held a star-chamber with each one of them to meet and compare notes to try to work out a bad thing in the way of training for the 1908 campaign.

"The trip is yours if you go out and bring home the pennant," was Comiskey's parting shot to each one of his players. If they do win the pennant the European trip will include a visit to London, Manchester, Berlin, Paris, Dublin and Rome.

INTERNATIONAL BOUTS BECOMING COMMON.

More foreign fighters have arrived in this country and more are coming. Bill Squires of Australia has crossed the Pacific to meet the best of American heavyweights and Johnny Summers, former heavyweight champion of England, is also here.

The English lightweight champion is also reported to be about to head this way. As a result of the Uncle Sam has invited John to Australia and Langford and Al Demont of Boston, recently fought their first contest in England and Jack O'Brien and Battling Nelson and the Noddy are soon to follow going to Europe in the near future.

erts has just returned to England after his second invasion of Philadelphia, and he may make a return trip in the fall. With so much traveling going on some of the fighters begin to think of making each other, and this has led to what is becoming an old chestnut.
