BRINGS ACTION FOR \$5,000.

The latest development in the wrangle between members of the Brubaker-Campbell Hardware company is a \$5,000 libel suit which was filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by J. G. Campbell against Charles E. Brubaker, It is alleged in the complaint, which contains five separate counts, that defendant made the following faise and malicious statements concerning plaintiff: "Campbell has been robbing the

company for a year;" "Campbell has stolen the Brubaker-Campbell Hardware company blind;" "Campbell is dishonest and has been robbing the till." It is claimed that the statements till." In that complaint Brubaker was charged with circulating false reports about the company in an attempt to injure its credit and business standing.
