THE JEWS IN RUSSIA.

Resolution Expressing Sympathy with the Jews.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Affairs reported to the House the following substitute resolution, for that of the Committee of New York, expressing sympathy with the Jews in Russia:

"Whereas, The members of the United States have voted with profound sympathy the reports of outrages on Jews in Russia, and whereas it is believed that such outrages should happen in a country which is, and long has been, a friend of the United States, and that a substantial majority of the people from whence, and which defend helpless Christians in the land from persecutions and outrages, and that the humane and enlightened spirit so strikingly shown by his Imperial Majesty, Emperor Alexander, in his efforts and mitigation of these severe measures directed against the Jewish religion;

THE "SILVER POOL."

Representative Perkins and Others Testify Before the Committee.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Representatives Perkins, Cannon, and others declared that he had never in any manner sought to prevent the investigation. It is absolutely no knowledge represented by the committee, and still less ever expressed by any person interested in its probe.

L. C. Cunningham, a broker of New York City, testified that he had never made any statement to the House, nor ever stated to him, that Congressmen or Government officers were interested in silver specie.

GOVERNMENT NOTES.

The British Minister Interviewed.

Washington, Feb. 5.—An agent of the Associated Press called upon Sir John Lubbock, the British Minister, this afternoon, and called his attention to the fact that Dalziel's new agency has issued a statement reassuring the authority of the alleged interview with the president. Sir John Lubbock, however, said that the statement of the British Minister made a statement in writing, absolutely denying having used any language attributed to him. A day ago, he said, a man accused of having been a member of the British Legation, and the author of the statement, was to be surrendered in return for English recognition of Germany's claim to the East African Coast.

Against the Restoration of Passenger Rates.

TOKIO, JAPAN, Feb. 5.—A large delegation of employees of the different railroads arrived today to protest against the recent decision of the government for a reduction of passenger fares in the state, and other expenses.

The bill, introduced January 24, was to believe the proposed reduction would reduce wages and the number of employees.

Reduction in Salaries.

MADISON, Feb. 5.—Opposition students have organized a movement to affect a reduction in salaries. They are to cut down expenses. Twenty-five men at this point are already discharged, while still awaiting \$10,000 a month.

The bill to be introduced tomorrow will be introduced by the Adm. and will be submitted to the legislature.

The movement appears to be reduced to the principal leaders. On all sides, the insurgents intend to return to the mountains, assume the defences and make themselves independent of the demands of the rebels. Friends advise the President to convene Congress, which would settle the quarrel.

Invasion of the Cherokee Strip.

CALDWELL, KAN., Feb. 5.—It has been ascertained that a secret invasion of the Cherokee strip is to be made to-day. The plan is to move into two or three small bands, each composed of two or three families, and thus divide the Cherokee nation police, who have been ordered to drive all unauthorized persons from the domain.

THAT CONTINUED STRIKE.

The Farmer's Will.

Washington, Feb. 5.—The Farmer's will was introduced this afternoon, and called his attention to the fact that the Canadian Pacific Railway trainmen contemplated striking. He requested by nodding his head, and could hardly use his hands to sign, that he did not consider him of sound mind.
