BUILDING DEMOLISHED.

Explosion in Chicago Wrecks Paint And Wall Paper Store.

Chicago, Sept. 4.—An explosion in the store of Stanley D. Graham, leader in paints and wallpaper, No. 140 North State street, at 3 o'clock this morning, wreck-ied the building and threas out of bed several persons asleep on the second floor, but mjured no one. The explosion was heard a mile away and the guests at the Virginia hatel, nearby, as well as occupants of the houses in the vicinity, were awakened and all were for a time excited and a few people ran into the streets.

Merchants Claim That They Are Slaving Their Lives Out for Their Landlords-Compared With Other Cities Salt Lake Stores Fetch the Highest Rents in the Country-A Few Sample Cases Set Forth.

Here is the rent condition in one fain street store with a small front-ge: The monthly rent is \$750, which mounts to \$9.000 annually. This is outvalent to 10 per cent on a busiyour house for rent or for sale, you list the price with it, and the real estate man acting as your agent in the effort The price with h, and the test to denote man acting as your agent in the effort to marked it, has is power to fix the price."
