Here we have the admission of gambling. In all other respects the suits for pos-session are jokes-as I characterized them in the court yesterday.'

GOREMYKIN MINISTRY.

Its Life is Prolonged Owing to Several Causes.

St. Petersburg, July 6 .-- The impossibility of forming a coalition minis-try together with the strength developed by the government in the coun-cil of the empire (upper house of parliament), evidently has had the effect of temporarily prolonging the life of the Goremykin ministry and also has resulted in the postponement of the emperar's contemplated cruise in Finnish waters.

Chicago, July 6 .-- America's climate, regarded by scientists as the prime factor in the country's marvelous growth from colonial days, may be the cause of its degeneracy, according to Prof. John Mason Tyler of Amherst college, one of the leading pedagogists of the world.

"Every decade," he explained to students at the University of Chicago yesterday, opening a series of lectures, Your climate has been drawing the strings on our nervous system tighter and tighter until now they are ready

to shap. "Physical degeneration is noticeable now in the children of the business and professional men." he asserted,

"The strain of modern life, the de-sire for wealth, for comfort and lux-ury is terrible," he said.
