Besides, a moment's reflection would show that it would fail to attain the object in view. The questions at issue affect the whole body of the people, and as a bulk they will remain immovable. Individual action to the contrary will not affect the matter in its entirety. The results of personal conduct will only, in the main, have an individual effect.
