FOREIGN.

ROME, 22.—The American pilgrims, to-day, presented the Pope an album and a collection of valuable diamonds.

PERNAMBUCO, 23.—The successful laying of the submarine cable, bringing Brazil into telegraphic communication with Europe, has been the occasion of much pleasurable excitement in this country, and a general jubilee in Pernambuco.

LONDON, 23.—The Post, to-day, says that an International Conference will assemble at St. Petersburg in 1875, for the purpose of revising the rules and regulations adopted by the Paris convention in 1865, for the government of telegraphic lines; some twenty-two States are expected to be represented by delegates.

The Florence Journal says the Pope has been presented with a copy of an address sent from the United States to Archbishop Ledochowski, of Posen. The Holy Father, in replying, said—"The United States is the only country where I am really Pope in the eyes of the government; I am always afraid lest the European governments shall oppose my acts, whereas I can freely send pontifical documents to the United States without fear of opposition on the part of its government."

Mr. Arch has consented to go to Canada with a party of agricultural laborers.

At a meeting of farmers in Newmarket, to-day, one of the speakers declared that he could undertake to import, from Canada, a sufficient number of unemployed laborers to fill the places of the men locked out in his section.

The St. Petersburg Gazette announces that the railway officials have received orders to make arrangements for the visit of the Queen of England, who is expected to be in Russia about September 14th.

The Time's Paris correspondent telegraphs that the condition of M. De Gaulard is hopeless.

The committee of the Agricultural Union, at Leamington, have adopted a resolution submitted by Dabeny, the Canadian emigration agent, declaring that, in view of the improbability of the settlement of the dispute between the farm laborers and their employers, vigorous measures are expected, therefore that Joseph Arch be asked to take a party of farm hands to Canada, that the Union provide a free passage thither for the locked out laborers, and for that purpose make a special appeal to the public for funds. The sum of five thousand dollars was then voted by the Union to secure passages for intending emigrants.

ROME, 23.—Several persons arrested on Sunday, for taking a prominent part in the Papal demonstration, have been variously sentenced to imprisonment to terms of six, twelve, or eighteen months.

PARIS, 23.—The vigorous efforts made by the Bonapartists to influence public opinion, and turn it to their own account, cause much uneasiness. The party is organizing a committee in every department, establishing newspaper organs, distributing political documents and petitions, and urging the restoration of the empire.

LONDON, 24.—Sir Bartle Frere having resigned the presidency of the Royal Geographical Society, Sir Henry C. Rawlinson, the former President, has been elected.

PARIS, 24.—The government prohibits the distribution in France of the photographs of the Prince Imperial.

ROME, 24.—Additional arrests are reported, growing out of the Papal demonstrations on Sunday last.

PARIS, 24.—The newspapers, *Figaro*, *La France* and *Le Soir* have been sued by the government for violation of the press laws, by reprinting Rochefort's letter; the verdict was "guilty with extenuating circumstances," and the proprietors were only fined a hundred francs each.

Beaver Crusaders Jubilant.

BEAVER, June 24th. Last night the "Crusaders" of Beaver City assembled in front of a saloon, on Main street, to celebrate the passage of the Poland bill, by firing off anvils, making crusading speeches and singing songs. At

9-30 p. m. about forty soldiers, with a martial band, marched down from Camp Beaver, joined with the mob and promenade the principal streets, "holloaing," shouting, yelling and firing off pistols, making night hideous, which was kept up till about midnight, no person interfering with the mob. Whiskey was free and huge bon-fires near Camp Beaver.
