In delivering the enlogy Father Kiely stated that man's inner nature was seldom manifest in his daily life. Enemices sometimes extend the hand of friendship. When we find a man of whom it can be said "he is what he pretends to be." with all his faults we must admire him. Such a man was Timothy Driscoll. He despised hyprocracy, in him there were no false pre-tenses. Beneath his rough exterior was a tender heart that beat in sym-pathy with suffering humanity. The disappointments of life did not change his character, and with all his faults he was a man, an honest man. His roughtst side was always shown to the world, but he loved the poor and was always helping them without letting the world know anything about it. Timothy Driscoll died as he lived, honest, brunt and frank, keeping his re-ligion to himself and going about doing

A large cortege of carriages followed the remains to Calvary cemetery where they were interred with due ceremony. Mr. Driscoll bequeathed \$1,000 to the Kearns St. Ann's Orphanage and \$500 to St. Mary's cathedral, showing that he held the waifs as well as his church n his memory.
