## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Another Briefest**—The social committee of the University club announces a briefest on the roof garden next Saturday evening. The imitator orchestra is expected to again hold forth.

**Cyrus Hawley Dead**—Word has been received in this city of the death at Muscatine, Ia., of Cyrus Hawley, formerly paying teller of the Utah National bank of this city, and who left this city some years ago. The interment was at Rockford, Ill.

**Sentenced to 20 Days**—Cornelius Kroymann was yesterday sent to jail for 20 days, by Judge C. B. Diehl, for assault and battery, committed upon the person of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Koop. The young man has been in trouble before on a number of occasions.

**Emancipation Day**—The colored population of this city are preparing to celebrate Emancipation day, Sept. 22, under the direction of Rev. Leander Brown of the Cavalry Baptist church. Speeches will be delivered by Alonzo Smith, Lee Mills, A. Douglass, W. P. Hough, J. F. Thompson and others.

**Mrs. Ellis Dead**—Mrs. A. C. Ellis, wife of the judge, died at Portland, yesterday, after two weeks' illness, and the body will be brought to this city for burial. Judge and Mrs. Ellis were en route to Alaska, and at Portland, Mrs. Ellis was stricken with what proved to be fatal illness. She was 62 years old.

**Wounded With Pick**—William Driscoll, a waterworks employe ran a pick into his foot yesterday while trench digging on Second South near Sixth East street. He was taken home and medical aid summoned. The sufferer is a brother of J. D. Driscoll who was killed at the Metcalf bottling works by an exploding tank, and is a relative of Thomas Kearns.

**Allen in Lead**—Capt. Robert H. Allen of the Twenty-ninth infantry led the southwestern division rifle shoot at Fort Sil, making a score of 895 hits out of a possible 1,000, the competitors numbering 14 officers and 15 enlisted men. Capt. Henry C. Clement, Jr., was third, with 744 hits to his credit. Sgt. David W. D. company led the enlisted men with 741 hits.

Kinnison of I company, recently stationed at Whipple barracks.

Violin solos were rendered by Roumania Hyde and Harry Lester, and songs by Emma Dunham. The judges were Mr. Pitt, Mr. Deacon and Mrs. Hodgins. Mrs. Lucy Montgomery, who had trained the class, presided.

# FAT SHEEP SHOW FOR SALT LAKE

Proposition With Others of Importance Will Be Considered At Saturday Meet.

WILL MAKE FINE EXHIBIT.

Organized Wool Men Propose to Give General Boost to Business and to Convention.

Regard Annual Gathering of National Wool Growers in This City as A Decided Compliment.

On the theory that "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," the sheepmen of this state and wool-growers of the country generally propose to continue their activity for the protection and promotion of their industry in every possible way by the maintenance of live working organizations.

It is no new policy with these thriving producers as throughout the past 20 years, in good seasons and bad ones, sheepmen have faithfully upheld at least one strong, central organization to fend off hurtful things and foster helpful ones affecting their industry; and at no time during this period has their national organization languished to a degree where its influence failed to potentiate legislative centers.

**PROFITABLE PRICES.**

In a price way, as well as others, for several years now sheep and wool growing have been gratifyingly profitable. Mutton and wool values have maintained upward trend to a point at the present time which has probably never before been attained for range offerings. To the end that this desirable condition of things may last indefinitely, that the quality of their offerings may improve, to justify its endurance, their freedom from disease and lessened restraint in movement, as well as economy in handling and marketing their products may be secured, the agencies so long successfully employed in these endeavors will be continued in their activity and supported with unflinching loyalty.

**MEETS HERE IN JANUARY.**

The National Wool Growers' association meets in this city in annual session next January, and the preliminary steps have already been taken toward making the occasion one of unusual interest, attendance and enjoyment to delegates by local stockmen in co-operation with the Commercial Club. At the initial meeting held 10 days ago to begin planning for the forthcoming convention, a score of prominent local sheepmen urged, among other things, that a display of live and fat sheep be made during convention week. The suggestion met the approval of all present, and it was decided to issue a call for a larger meeting to be held at the Commercial club at 4 p. m., Saturday afternoon, Aug. 25. All breeders and feeders, sheepmen in general and business men as well, of the city and state interested in the convention are invited to attend the meeting. Plans will be perfected for a splendid exhibition of sheep at least, and it may be also decided at that time to enlarge the display, including other classes of live stock.

**LETTER TO SHEEPMEN.**

The subpoenaed letter which is addressed to sheepmen throughout Utah has been numerous mailed in the past few days:

Salt Lake City, Utah, Dear Sir:—You are no doubt aware that the National Wool Growers' association has selected Salt Lake City in which to hold its next annual session. The preference displayed in this selection is extremely complimentary to Utah, its magnificent capital city, its thrifty commercialism and its greatest of all industries, sheep breeding.

Aside from the duty devolving upon us to make proper acknowledgment of this preference, an opportunity is presented in the entertainment of the forthcoming convention and the promotion of its important labors to favorably advertise the already well established excellence of Utah sheep and wool. The preliminary steps in such a movement have already been taken at a meeting which authorized the issue of this letter. It is now desired that a larger number of interested men be brought together to enlarge plans already submitted for the reception of the convention.

An exhibition of fine and fat sheep is proposed as a desirable feature of the week, and on this proposal and other entertainment suggestions, your presence at the next meeting is desired. The time appointed for the conference is 2 p. m., Saturday, Aug. 25. The place, Commercial club rooms, Salt Lake.

The next annual meeting of the National will be the most important one in its history. The time to do things for the lasting good of the industry is now. Every sheepman in Utah will profit by the deliberations of the next annual session of the association. He is therefore interested in the preparations being made for its reception. Please attend next Saturday's meeting, as well as any subsequent ones which will be called.

**PRISON GUARD POISONED.**

Officer Driggs and Convict Hopson Made Violently Ill.

N. R. Driggs, a guard at the state prison, and William G. Hopson, a convict and clerk of the south cell house, were taken violently ill Monday night,

after drinking from a pan of milk that had been set for a few moments on a window ledge in the south cell house. The guard was incapacitated from duty and Prison Physician A. C. Young was sent for. It was some time before Mr. Driggs was pronounced out of danger. As a pan of the same milk was taken to the north cell house and drunk from with impunity, it is believed one of the "Cons" dropped poison into the first pan of milk, hoping thereby to make Mr. Driggs helpless. Later on as he is in charge of the night watch in the south cell house. This would have made it easier for prisoners to secure his keys and get into the yard where some of them in a mass move might have got over the wall. If this supposition is incorrect, it is believed men's malice was at the bottom of the move.

It was observed that Wilson and Wood were using "sure-thing" dice. When the game had proceeded far enough to convince the officers of its crookedness, and the "sure-things" had lost some money, the pair were taken into custody. The victims escaped.

Wilson and Wood were placed in the city jail, but the colored man was later released on a \$50 cash bond, furnished by a white woman, who claimed to be his wife.
