**Home Them.**

A good price can be obtained here for almost any quantity of potatoes of fair quality, but the article is not sufficiently abundant to supply the demand. Utah potatoes are wanted abroad.

**Of barley and oats**

there are being imported from abroad in large bulk.

**The market is glutted with wheat.**

The home consumption is far behind the supply, and there is no demand for it in other markets.

**The foregoing is a simple statement of facts, and should teach our farmers the absolute necessity of sowing and planting an increased breadth of barley, oats and potatoes.**

It is a fact that Utah has seldom raised enough of the first two of the products named for home use, and they generally command a good price at home.

**This extra attention to the raising of those products need interfere with wheat, if any, with the culture of wheat.**

**Attention Directed.**

Since the city entered upon the project of trying to obtain an artesian well on the bench, northeast of the city, for the purpose of watering the cemetery, the owners of lots on that range of high land are directing their attention to them. Some have recently been cleared of sage brush, plowed and sown in lucern. The incentive to this movement is the better prospect for water looming up. Should the artesian well project prove successful that whole "side of the north" will be improved and built upon with great rapidity, and lots will be greatly increased in value. For residence there is no more desirable location in the valley.

**The effect of water upon that portion of the city would be to greatly increase the revenue of the city, by enhancing the value of the property in that locality.**

**Opera.**

There was a full house at the opera performance in the 15th Ward Assembly Rooms last night. The audience were well pleased with the performance, manifesting their gratification by frequent and hearty applause. Higham and Mr. Snow, of the University of Deseret, took observations at the north-east corner of the railroad depot, and the north-east corner of the Temple Block to ascertain the height of Black Mountain, the highest peak seen to the north-east from the city, lying from City Creek Cañon. From the Temple block corner the elevation was found to be 2,975. The distance between the two points, in a direct line is three miles and five feet.

**AN ORDINANCE**

Amending "An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating the Sale of Spirituous and Fermented Liquors," passed August 5th, 1876, and is hereby amended as follows:

**SECTION 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City,**

that section 6 of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Licensing and Regulating the Sale of Spirituous and Fermented Liquors," passed August 5th, 1876, be and is hereby amended as follows:

**Sec. 6.—Any person obtaining License under this Ordinance shall be subject to the following regulations:**

He shall faithfully observe and keep all ordinances in force in relation to liquor during the period of such license; he shall not keep open his bar, house, or place for the sale of liquors, nor sell, give away, nor in any manner deal in by himself, servant or other person, any spirituous or fermented liquors between the hours of ten o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening, on any day of the week; he shall prohibit all gaming, with or without betting, by means of dominoes, cards, dice or other articles, every game of chance, and every other description of gaming or gambling; and on the proclamation of the Mayor for all liquor establishments to be closed, he shall discontinue business during the period of such proclamation. He shall not allow any wine or liquors to be taken out of his establishment to any person under sixteen years of age, nor to any Indian; he shall prohibit music, dancing, drumming and all riotous or disorderly conduct on his premises. He shall not barter, sell, or give away any spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors, on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, except he be the keeper of a drug store, and then only for medicinal purposes, on the prescription of a regularly licensed physician, and any person violating any of the provisions of this section, shall, on conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not exceeding ninety-nine dollars, or be imprisoned not exceeding one hundred days, or both; Provided, that when any person is convicted of disposing of any of the before-mentioned liquors on Sunday, he shall, in addition to the punishment heretofore prescribed, forfeit his license, and if convicted a second time of disposing of any such liquors during prohibited hours on days other than Sunday, shall also forfeit his license, and any person whose license has been so forfeited shall not be granted another license to engage in such business for one year thereafter.

**Section 2.—That section seven of said ordinance is hereby amended so as to read:**

Section 7.—If any person shall keep any house or place within the corporate limits of this city, for the purpose of selling, or otherwise disposing of spirituous or fermented liquors, as provided in this ordinance, without first having obtained a license therefor, as herein provided, on conviction thereof he shall pay a fine of ninety-nine dollars for the first offense, and if convicted a second offense, a fine of ninety-nine dollars, and be imprisoned not to exceed thirty days; and for each subsequent conviction a fine of ninety-nine dollars and imprisonment not to exceed one hundred days. If any restaurant keeper shall allow spirituous or fermented liquors to be drunk on his premises at any time prohibited in this ordinance, he shall, on conviction, be liable to a fine in any sum not exceeding ninety-nine dollars, and for the second offense shall, in addition to such fine, forfeit his license as such restaurant keeper, and shall not be granted another license for a term of six months thereafter.
