FIVE MORE IN SHERIFF'S NET.

Deputies Raid Dive in Commercial Street and Get a Good Haul.

A raid by deputy sheriffs at the place known as 24 Commercial street, over the Alamo room, resulted in the arrest of two women and three men on charge of vagrancy and resorting to houses of ill repute. None could furnish the money and all were locked up for the night.

HEAVY RAIN KEPT COMMITTEES HOME

Councilmen Fail to Gather for
Thursday's Regular
Meeting.

ONLY TWO WERE PRESENT

Streets and Police Were Represented
And a Small Volume of Business Was Transacted.

Only two committees of the city council could muster quorums last night, these being the streets committee and the police committee. The first named decided to adjourn at 11 o'clock, with the understanding that the petition of W. F. James relative to the placing of a pole on East First South street, Mr. James suggested that the poles on the north side be placed within one foot of the curb, as that in his opinion would have a better appearance. On the south side of the street it is necessary to set the poles six feet from the curb, owing to the presence of water mains, and the committee decided that Mr. James' point was not well taken.

Councilman Reedall took a decided stand against Mr. James, both before the committee and in the council Monday evening. He attributed Mr. James' stand to "pride." He insists that Mr. James has a board fence that is a nuisance and an eyesore, and declares his intention of seeing that it comes down at once.

The committee authorized repairs on Third West between North Temple and North Second, to be placed there at a cost not to exceed \$200. Property owners on Broadway will be asked to pave that thoroughfare with asphaltum immediately.

The police committee turned down the appointment made by Chief Pitt that Harold D. McMartin fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Parsonham, J. T. Tyler. Similar action was taken in the case of P. R. Muth, who asked to be made a special officer for the Merchants' Protective patrol. The resignation of A. H. Lund to be permitted to wear the badge of an officer to patrol in the neighborhood of Union square was referred to the chief of police.

ROPE IN CELLAR TO HANG SPOUSE

Mrs. W. W. Adams Says She Was
Shown a Noose Prepared for Her.

HUSBAND IS NOW IN JAIL

He Is Charged With Threatening to Commit Murder—Arrest Made in Bingham.

W. W. Adams, who was charged with threatening to murder his wife, as stated in yesterday's "News," was arrested late yesterday afternoon at Bingham and is now lodged in the county jail. The allegations made by Mrs. Adams against her husband are most startling and are to the effect that on numerous occasions he has told her that he would kill her and once showed her a rope suspended from the ceiling in the cellar, telling her that he intended to hang her and that before morning she would be "under six feet of soil."

The latest trouble in the Adams household was Wednesday night, when, as the wife claims, the husband buckled on a revolver and showed his intention of murdering the entire family before morning. He left the house, and then the children were sent to the home of a neighbor by Mrs. Adams, after which she proceeded to walk to the house of a friend at Fourteenth South and State street, more than eight miles from her home. She spent the remainder of the night there, and yesterday appeared at the office of the county attorney and swore out a complaint against her husband.

A few weeks ago Mrs. Adams left home and went to Denver. The husband followed her to the Colorado city and found that she had traveled thither with a young Greek. The husband had the appearance of an elopement, but Mrs. Adams maintains that the meeting on the train was quite accidental, the young Greek having been on his way to his native land. She was induced to return to her home and children, but it seems that trouble continued in the household, until Mrs. Adams was in jail, with a serious charge hanging over him. There are three children in the Adams family, ranging from 11 to 6 years.
