STREET FAIR.

The committee on streets who have had under consideration the petition of J. Wash Young and others, asking for the privilege of holding a street fair in this city from July 22nd to 27th, be the coming summer, reported favorably on the matter. Mr. Young is required to give a bond in the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of indemnifying the city against any and all damage to the streets that may result from the hold-ing of the fair. It is proposed to use both sides of the streets asked for, from the curb stones out for about 15 or 20 the curb stones out for about 15 or 20 feet, not to go further than the stone pavement. This space will be used by merchants and others on which to erect booths and therein display their goods Space not required by the abutting property owners will be given over to amusement stands, etc. The amount of license to be exacted from people with shows and other attractions, went over.
