New York, Feb. 7 .- Opening prices on the stock exchange showed improvement over last night's final figures. In some instances the gains were very pronounced, including St. Paul, Rock Island, Denver, and Rio Grande, Union Pacific and Chesapeake and Ohio, which were up from 1 to 11/2. Railroad stocks were the most active, blocks of from 2,000 to 5,000 shares being bought of Ontario and Western, Erie, Reading, and Union Pacific. "Taken altogether, the situation is unsatisfactory, although it is gratifying to know that a basis has at length been reached on which manufacturers are willing to operate, but there is little satisfaction for the wool merchants in doing business on the level of tomarket. day
