FARM WASTE. Most Important Question Confronting The American People.

strange as it man seem they appear to be rather disappointed that the evils they have been predicting bid fair to fail of fulfillment. The snow is light, The most important subject confronting the American people is the question of waste. National wealth depends fully as much upon complete utilization of raw materials as it does upon mere activity in the factors of production. Efficient production is a corollary growing out of the solution of the problem of waste. The American people have been prodigal of the great and magnificent natural opportunities that lay before them: soils have been exent time, the prevailing trouble being hausted by ignorant and careless cu tivators; the timber vandal has wan-

couly destroyed our virgin forests; calities, presenting the finest natural scenery in the world, have been dese-crated by ignorant and profane hands; agriculture has been turned over to ignorance and to empiricism. The rule has been waste; the exception has been economy.

The writer of this article has vivid recollections of the wastefulness and prodigatity of farm life when he was a boy. When "hog killing" day cam around it was the usual custom t throw away as offal the heads, feet, hair, intestines, hearts and livers of the animals. Fine apples and peaches were allowed to decay on the ground or were fed to hogs. Great oaks that had withstood the storms of time for centuries, were ruthlessly cut down and consigned to the flames; wheat straw of a superior quality was burned; fine

walnut trees, fit only for cabinet work and incentor finishing, were split into rails for fencing; hay instead of being put in under shelter, was stacked in the fields, where at least one-fifth rotted during the winter; milch cows were indifferently exposed to the heat of summer and to the cold of winter; horses were stabled in stalls unfit for animals; domestic animals were maimed by slitting ears and by cropping tails without the least show of cuse for such barbarities; wheat in the sheaf was put into plies in the fields where the grain of

ten sprouted or rotted. Of course some of this loss was unavoid. able on account of primitive conditions and frontier life; but much of it was the result of ignorance and of down-right carelessness. The American pioneer, in many cases, depended too much upon muscle and not enough upon brain activity.
