### JANITOR OUT DOORS.

The janitor should have the oversight of pupils on the grounds, and should call the attention of the teachers to any misdemeanors, but should not lay hands on the pupils except in extreme emergeucies.

#### CONCLUSION.

In a school thus provided with all that conduces to health, com-fort and decency, if well admin-istered by a faithful corps of teach-ers, pupils will be likely not only to secure a valuable course of instruction in a definite list of studies. but also to acquire ideas and ideals of life and conduct which can hardly fail to be of great service to themselves and to society.

# SAN JUAN STAKE CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of the Sau Juan Btake of Zion was held at this place on the 22nd and 28rd of November. There were pres-ent Apostle F. M. Lyman, Elder B. H. Roberts, of the First Seven Presidents of the Seventies; President F. A. Hammond and Counsel-ors, and a fair representation of the Bishops and leading brethren from the various Wards of the Stake.

The speakers during the confer-ence were Apostle F. M. Lyman, Elder B. H. Roberts, Presidents F. A. Hammond, Wm. Halls, and Platte D. Lyman. of the Stake Presidency, and the Bishops and representative brethren, who re-ported their various wards and were of a practical nature, the Saints present being exhorted to lead honest, virtuous lives. The Priesthood and other leading members of the Church were also addressed on the manner in which they should discharge the responsibilities resting upon them.

Elder Platte D. Lyman was sus-tained as Second Counselor to President Hammond, in the place of Elder Wm. Adams, who had re-signed on account of failing health, and was honorably released. Elder Hiram M. Taylor was sus-

To the Hon. Mayor and Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen-Pursuant to your structions in the matter of the petition of Elizabeth Picknell and others, I beg to report that I have established in the east boundary line of the mayor's entry from notes and plats in the United States Surveyor General's office and four the theory of the states of the states of the states of the states of the state of the st office and from the stone monument fixed by the government to perpetitute the southeast corner of section 32 T, 1 N R 1 E, of the Salt Lake meridian. The city attorney reported the following bills for ordinances: An ordinance levying the tax and for the assessment of property on both sides of Second South street, in side-walk district 4, between First East and Third East streets for the purpose of constructing sidewalks there-ou; an ordinance levying the tax for paving First East from the south line of South Temple to the north line of Fourth South, in paving district No. 1; an ordinance levying the tax for curbing and guttering First East from South Femple to Fourth South.

The committee on finance reported as follows: After thorough in-vestigation and with the suggestion of the city treasurer and bankers of the city, would recommend that the date for the receiving of and opening bids for \$300,000 of city bonds be changed as follows, to wit: That bids for said bonds be received from December 15, 1890, to January 15. 1891, at which time said bids shall be opened at 10 o'clock a.m., and awarded according to ordinance. Further, that the advertisement heretofore provided for, relative to the state of said bonds, shall read to conform to above change in date. Adopted.

Committee on sanitation and quarantine regulations reported that they had carefully inspected the Opera House plumbing, referred to at the last meeting. It was done In violation of the ordinance, and recommended that Mr. E. H. Rush, who did the work, be forfelted ac-cording to rale C of the new ordinances to govern of plumbing. Adopted. drainage and
