## LOCAL BELIEFS.

**Murray Files on Water.**—The municipality of Murray, Utah, has filed with the city engineer for water from Little Cottonwood creek for lighting and 750 horse power.

**Inspect Plute Reservoir.**—The state land board has gone to Richfield to inspect the Plute Reservoir. The project which will require another year to complete. This scheme will reclaim 22,000 acres of land in Sanpete and Sevier counties. The outlet tunnel, already built, cost \$45,000.

**Railroad Presents Petition.**—The Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad company filed a petition yesterday with the city recorder asking that the pavement on the south side of Third South street between Sixth and Seventh West streets be abandoned when the extension is made. The company states that the ground is owned by the railroad company and that it is not open to the public.

**Will Meet Weekly.**—The Real Estate association decided at yesterday afternoon's luncheon to hold weekly, instead of bi-weekly meetings until after the annual outing of June 29. It was decided to have the chairman of the board of governors, E. P. Colborn, appointed delegate for the association to the National Irrigation congress which will be held in Spokane August 9 to 14, and to the Trans-mississippi Commercial Congress, which will be held at Denver, August 16 to 23.

**Nelson Returns.**—A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of schools, returned yesterday from an inspection of the schools of Beaver county. He said that the new school building there will be one of the finest in the state. It contains ten rooms and will be opened for the next school year. Mr. Nelson will today for Richfield to make an address to the graduates at the commencement exercises of the high school. On Sunday he will go to Vernal, to attend the Trans-mississippi Commercial Congress of the Rich county schools.

## RUMORS OF A NEW EXPRESS COMPANY

Harriman and Gould Project Said To be Forming for Big Enterprise.

### TIME SCHEDULE REDUCED

Five Days from Chicago to San Francisco is the Plan Instead of Seven Days Now Required.

Rumors of the organization of a gigantic new express company, which will include one of the leading express companies of Denver, and which may be able to monopolize a great portion of transcontinental business by reason of the fact that it will reduce the time between New York and San Francisco, via Denver and Salt Lake, by 35 hours, are afloat among express circles. It is said the new company will be backed by Edward H. Harriman and George Gould, and that the two interests will work in harmony to accomplish the shortening of the time between coast and coast a full day and a half.

The new company, it is said, will be ready for business this fall upon the completion of the new line, which is expected to be ready for traffic some time in September. The route of the new line will be over the Northern Pacific, which is being pressed to the utmost, and that the road will be ready for business at the time appointed, is the thorough belief of the men who are in charge of the work.

Seven days are now consumed in transporting express packages from New York to San Francisco; when the Harriman-Gould combination goes into effect, the time will be reduced to a little over five days.

According to the best reports obtainable, the route of the new line will be over the Northern Pacific, which is controlled by Harriman, from the Atlantic coast to Pittsburgh. At the latter point the Gould lines take up the matter and by way of the Vabash it will be delivered to Chicago. Here the Union Pacific takes up the haul and the matter is landed in Salt Lake City, where the Western Pacific takes it over and delivers it in San Francisco, the entire journey requiring only five and a half days to complete.

It is said that when Harriman acquired a big block of Denver & Rio Grande stock, he had this coup in express business in view, especially as the Rio Grande stock carried with it a large interest in the Globe express company, at Denver, which the new combination is said to be planning to absorb.

### ICE CREAM OF LOW GRADE.

State Chemist Submits Report of His Analysis to State Inspector.

After making analysis of several samples of ice cream peddled on the streets, Herman Harms, state chemist, reported yesterday to Willard Harms, state food and dairy commissioner, that the product was below the standard. As a result of this investigation an effort will be made to compel the sale of the pure article. The law requires that ice cream be made of cream in the frozen product. Only two of the samples reached this standard. The manufacturers of the other samples were notified that their product was below the standard. This phase of the question is also being investigated by the food and dairy commissioner.

Mr. Harms made several other tests at the request of Mr. Hanson. Several samples of milk delivered in Ogden were found to be unsatisfactory. Nine samples showed dirt plainly. The dirt was found in the cream. One sample taken from a junction dealer was unfit for human consumption.

It has been reported that a number of local ice cream makers have been using some preservatives to keep their meats. They have been used to sprinkle over steaks and other expensive cuts. This matter is also being investigated.

### ANDERSON ELECTED A HERO.

Nine-Year-Old Boy Demonstrates His Nerve Before Classmates.

In the eyes of his classmates, 9-year-old Ernest Anderson, whose home is 1325 Lincoln avenue, is the hero of the Emerson school. He yesterday won all the popularity and admiration accorded even the gridiron and diamond heroes, by jumping from a second story window into a life net, showing his schoolmates how easy it is when "you ain't scared."

Little Anderson's feat was accomplished at fire headquarters, where for the past day or two the pupils of the sixth grade at the Emerson school have been studying the workings and equipment of the fire department. A prize is offered by the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition for the best essay on fire fighting, the contest being open to the pupils of the sixth grade and the members of the sixth grade at Emerson are after the prize. Fire Chief W. H. Glor is assisting the boys and girls by not only showing all the fire fighting equipment, but its manner of use as well.
