GUESSING CONTESTS ARE LOTTERIES.

Indictments have been found by the grand jury charging Nathan Frank, owner and publisher of the St. Louis Star, an afternoon newspaper; August Frank, business manager, and M. J. Lowenstein, formerly business mana-ger of the same paper, with advertis-ing a lottery and with establishing a lottery.

There are three charges on the first indictment and one on the second for each of the men. They gave bond for \$1,000 on each count and by a mistake were required to give bond for \$15,000. These indictments are brought as the result of what was advertised as a profit sharing contest. Large prizes were offered to the person guessing nearest the attendance at the world's fair on opening day. The guessers were required to pay a certain sum. It is said that the contest was open to new subscribers to the paper and persons who paid to submit guesses. The contest was advertised in the pa-There are three charges on the first

who paid to submit guesses. The contest was advertised in the pa-per and on billboards to a great extent, and on the advertisement the greater number of the indictments are founded. August Frank said that the contest was instituted for the purpose of stimu-lating interest in the opening day at the fair and in the world's fair general-ly,--St. Louis Republic.
