GUESSING CONTESTS ARE LOTTERIES.

Indictments have been found by the grand jury charging Nathan Frank, owner and publisher of the St. Louis Star, an afternoon newspaper, August Frank, business manager, and M. J. Lowenstein, formerly business manager of the same paper, with advertising a lottery and with establishing a lottery.

There are three charges on the first indictment and one on the second for each of the men. They gave bond for \$1,000 on each count and by a mistake were required to give bond for \$1,000. These indictments are brought as the result of what was advertised as a profit sharing contest. Large prizes were offered to the person guessing nearest the attendance at the world's fair on opening day. The guessers were required to pay a certain sum. It is said that the contest was open to new subscribers in the paper and persons who paid to submit guesses.
