Charles E. Maynard Meets Shocking Death in Depot Yards.

## Was an Old and Respected S. P. Employe - Peculiar Morse Deal -Funeral of Charles Driver.

A shocking railway accident occurred yesterday morning by which Charles E. Maynard was killed, at the railway crossing on Twenty-fourth street by a switch engine.

Mr. Maynard, who has been boarding at Mrs. Hammond's, 106 Twenty-fourth street, left the house at about 7 o'clock to go to the Southern Pacific roundhouse, which is situated in the depot yards, where he was employed as foreman. He was carrying an umbrella, as it was storming, and it is supposed the umbrella obscured the approaching switch engine from his view, and as was quite aged, it is feared he did not hear the engine which was pulling an express car, moving at a good rate The switch epgine was run by Engineer James Brown, who has been in the employ of the Southern been in the employ of the Southern Pacific for a long time, and is consid-ered a careful man. There was no one on the front of the engine, as there should have been. It struck Mr. May-nard in his left side and knocked him under the wheels of the engine which dragged him nearly a half block before could be stopped. When the locomo-ve was stopped the lifeless body was removed from under the wheels in a bly mangled condition, almost be-

yond recognition. Mr. Maynard, was 62 years of age at the time of his death, and was one of the most highly respected employes of he Southern Pacific. During the past 16 years he has been employed by that company and for a number of years past has been foreman of their shops. He was very highly esteemed by his relow employes, being of a kind dispo-sition, and made friends of all who were privileged to associate with him, le has no family living, having burled hts wife about four years ago, he has a nephew, Reggie Brown, who is now in San Francisco, also a sister, Mrs. Pope-well, a resident of Ogden. His nephew has been telegraphed, and no disposi-tion will be made of the remains until

he arrives. Justice of the Peace J. P. Hall was summoned and with a jury viewed the remains and the scene of the terrible cident, but concluded not to hold the inquest until today.

The sad news of his death came as a severe shock to his many friends, be-cause although advanced in years ha enjoyed apparently good health.
