LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Home Mission.—The regular meeting of the Home Missionaries of this State will be held to-morrow Wednesday evening, at 7 o'clock.

Macallister the Wizard.—A large audience witnessed the opening performance of the Macallister engagement, last evening, and all were highly delighted with the skill of the Professor as a magician, as well as with his generous distribution of handsome and valuable gifts to the patrons of the entertainment. To-morrow he will appear again in new feats of illusion and more presents will be made to the audience.

House Robbery.—On Sunday night the house of a Mr. Shelton in the 15th Ward, was entered by burglars. They came in through a back window, went through a trunk belonging to the servant girl and took therefrom a purse with several dollars in cash, a pair of gloves, a package of photographs and a silk handkerchief. The robbery was committed about midnight. No clue to the thieves.

Another Burglary.—J. C. Anderson, superintendent of the Grass Valley co-operative store, tells that on Thursday night, the 11th inst., the store was broken into and articles to the value of from \$60 to \$75 stolen. The things taken were a belt of check shirting, one bolt of cottonade, besides pocket knives and other small articles. As an attempt will probably be made to sell the goods, purchasers should be on the look out for the burglars.

Feeling Comfortable.—We are pleased to learn that Sister Hannah Wallace, who was thrown from a wagon by a runaway team yesterday forenoon, is feeling quite comfortable to-day. When she struck the ground her shoulder and right side sustained the force of the fall, and the injury to the head was therefore less than at first supposed. She recovered consciousness yesterday afternoon and toward evening was able to sit up. She will be up and around again in a short time.

Welcome Home.—President William Budge, of Bear Lake Stake, who for nearly two and a half years has been presiding over the European Mission, returned to Salt Lake this morning. He was accompanied by Elder Hugh Watson, of this city, who has been on a mission for nearly two years, and both were met at the depot by quite a number of their friends. They arrived at Ogden last night by the delayed U. P. train, but owing to the lateness of the hour, remained there over night, and reached this city by the 11.30 a.m. express. We bid them a hearty welcome home.

Exciting Encounter.—The Black-foot Register gives a description of an encounter between Mr. J. W. Keeney, formerly of Ogden, and a Dr. O'Callaghan, on Saturday morning, the 20th inst. O'Callaghan was raising a disturbance in Mr. Keeney's hotel at Blackfoot, when the proprietor remonstrated with him. O'Callaghan retorted savagely, called Keeney a liar several times, and pulled a self-cocking revolver on him. The latter grabbed at the pistol and caught it, but not in time to prevent the discharge. The bullet grazed the inside of his left hand and just touched his ear. In return Mr. Keeney took the pistol and striking his assailant over the head several times, knocked him senseless.

"Junction" Jots.—From last night's Junction, we learn the following:

Joseph Smith, who a day or two since while wrestling in fun, with a butcher, was accidentally cut in the thigh, is out on the street again. His wound is doing well.

On Saturday the police made a raid on a Chinese opium den, on Fifth Street, and the proprietor was brought up to-day and fined.

On Friday evening last, a party was held at Utah. During the evening, a couple of individuals, J. Stinson and E. Adams, who were in attendance at the dance, got into an altercation, which resulted, eventually, in the former using a knife upon the latter, cutting an ugly gash in the back of Adams' shoulder, about eight inches in length, besides stabbing him in the left breast. The wounds are serious but not necessarily dangerous.

Bigamy.—The examination of a young man named Frederick Chandler, on a charge of bigamy, was held before Commissioner E. T. Sprague yesterday. The defendant was charged by Rosina Chandler, whom he admitted having married on the 27th of last February, at Tooele, and by her cousin, J. H. Gold, with having married a girl named Minnie James on the 18th of last month, in Sandy precinct, the latter ceremony being performed by Justice Harrison of that precinct. Justice Harrison, being questioned, testified to having married Chandler and Miss James, on the date mentioned, being then in ignorance of his existing relations with the plaintiff, Rosina Chandler. After Mr. Harrison's examination, the case was postponed until the 30th inst., at 3 p.m., to obtain other witnesses. Chandler, it is said, confesses to the two marriages; but pleads in extenuation that his first wife who had moved from Tooele to Bingham after their union, was false to him, and that he left her on that account, and that while working at the Germania Smelter, he afterwards became criminally intimate with Miss James and was forced to marry her. Of his first marriage, he states something similar in effect, but more shameful in details. He first became acquainted with Rosina, then a married woman, on the Sevier, and was engaged to take her to her husband in Bingham. On the way thither by team, she persuaded him, he says, to acts of shameful intimacy with her, and he yielded continually to her advances, then and after she had rejoined her husband in Bingham. The husband and wife subsequently quarreling, she represented herself to Chandler as being envious to him, and required him to marry her, which he did at Tooele, as stated. To this remarkable story, he adds, that after her removal from Tooele to Bingham, he learned that she was of a "loose reputation," and that is why he deserted her. The query is, why need he to have waited so long before arriving at such a conclusion, and then take what he "heard" as evidence to condemn her, after working at the positive knowledge of her bad character, manifested by her criminal conduct with himself. But this is his version. Others are yet to appear.

A Wonderful Bird.—There is a small boy in the upstairs window of a down town bakery, who has a very large habit of making himself facetious and extraordinary by beguiling the passers-by, and at the same time neglecting his work, without its being detected either by the victims of his mischievous pranks, or the man who hires him for something more useful. The young prodigy was evidently brought up in a Punch and Judy show, or has developed a startling talent for that species of mimicry since the late visit here of the Blacksmith's Dream. He stations himself in his window, which is above the canvas awning of the place he infests, and by squealing through a rent in the cloth at pedestrians, at all hours of the day and night, has induced many to believe that there was some sort of a strange talking bird on the premises, which had its cage in the window aforesaid. The ruse was highly appreciated in its youth, but is fast becoming venerable, and like a good story too often told, already gives symptoms of gray hairs and dissolution. If the young man don't want a coroner's inquest held over his joke and a verdict of "died of old age" rendered in the case, he had better desist at once. Let up, sonny, you are no longer taken for a parrot; beware lest your perseverance causes you to be taken for a small goose.
