

## VAUGHAN WINS TEN MILE RACE.

Oscar Julius Captures the Greatest  
Number of Laps.

## AMATEUR RECORDS BROKEN

In the Local Professional Team Match  
Race, Samuelson and Edmonds  
Defeat Emery and Green.

W. B. Vaughan won the second  
ten-mile lap race at the Salt Palace last  
evening in 21:52, which beats his time in  
the first race of that kind.

In the home stretch the riders were  
pretty closely bunched and Vaughan  
had all he wanted to do and a dollar's  
worth more to beat Samuelson, who  
came in second. John Green came third  
and Clem Turville fourth.

Oscar Julius proved the greatest lap-  
per in the bunch and got away with 39;  
W. F. King, 9, and King also won  
greatest number of miles, 3.

Bob Waime showed up well in this  
event and forced the others to ride  
hard for their money. At the beginning  
of the third mile he jumped out and  
took the lead holding it for six laps.

He won the fifth mile by a brilliant  
sprint which he kept up until the third

## THE YALE AND HARVARD VARSITY BOAT CREWS.

Probably the most interesting contest of the year in college aquatics is the annual meeting of the Harvard and Yale  
varsity eights on the river Thames at New London. This season's race has been looked forward to with particular ex-  
citement because of the varying results of recent years. In 1899 the Harvard crew beat the Yale oarsmen by a good margin.  
Last year Yale's boat finished first by a few seconds, after a most exciting race.

Smith and Clayton second. Grames and  
Angel took the third heat from the 65-  
yard mark. Smith and Clayton got sec-  
ond and won the race in winning eleven  
points. Grames and Angel won ten  
points and Heagren and Hume nine.

In the local professional team race  
between Samuelson-Edmonds vs Emery  
and Ben Green, Edmonds vs Emery  
each time and interfered with the pace

Samuelson a chance to cut ahead. As a  
result Edmonds and Samuelson won  
twelve points to the others ten.
