Delano Resigned as Secretary of the

New York, 25.—A Washington

dispatch to the Post says that the

resignation of Secretary Delano was

placed in the hands of the Presi-

dent before his departure for the

West, to take effect early in Octo-

ber, and it is not believed that he

will return here again to actively

resume his duties as head of the

interior department, but merely to

close up his private affairs. The

Secretary has already had all his

private papers packed up and re-

moved from the interior depart-

ment, and his picture has been or-

dered hung on the wall of the

secretary's office with those of for-

mer ex-secretaries. There is much

quiet speculation as to his suc-

cessor, but nothing definite can be

certain as to the President's in-

tention; it was known some months

ago that the President contemplated

making Assistant Secretary Corwin

Secretary ad interim for a short

time on the retirement of Delano,

but it is said, by those in close re-

lation with the view of the

President, that he has abandoned this

idea, and will make no appointment

until the same dispatch says that two

prominent physicians, viz., Dr. John

Donohue, of the Supreme

court, ordered an order-to-day, by

the consent of all parties concern-

ed, dissolving the American Tim-

ber and Manufacturing Co.

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
