Sir-On the 10th of May, 1909, you referred to me for investigation a com-munication received by you from one Charles R. Mabee of Detroit, 'Michigan, in which it was charged that certain officers of an organization known as the New York Anti-Saloon league had misused funds of the society entrusted to their care. In the course of a conference which

the New York Anti-Saloon league had misused funds of the society entrusted to their care. In the course of a conference which I had with Mr. Mabee relative to the charges stated in his letter, he inform-ed me that he would bring to this of-fice a number of men who would make statements substantiating the charges relative to the misuse of the society's funds. I stated to Mr. Mabee that I would be obliged to rely on him to bring the said gentlemen here for the reason that most of them lived outside of the state of New York and could not be compelled to appear before the grand jury of this county under sub-poena. Mr. Mabee stated that he would bring the gentlemen. The date of June 7 was agreed upon for the conference, and that date was after-wards changed, at the request of Mr. Mabee, to June 14. No one appeared at this office on the latter date but a communication was received from Mr. Mabee stating that he was unable to bring the gentlemen named by him to this office. Of the witnesses named by Mr. Mabee, two residents of the state of New York, namely, the Rev. Hervey Wood, and the Rev. F. E. Tow-er, both of which gentlemen have in-formed me that they knew nothing of the charges made by Mr. Mabee, and that they did not wish to have any con-nection whatever therewith. Several gentlemen connected with the New York Anti-Saloon league, how-ever, called at this office, amongst them the Rev. Dr. Funk, the Rev. Howard Russell, the Rev.
