

Killing of Two White Men by Black Men Was the Cause Of the Mobbing-

ARE LYNCHED

NINE NEGROES

ONE OF ACCUSED CONFESSED

Both Races Have Secured Arms and The Situation in Sabine County, Texas, is Very Threatening,

Houston, Texas, June 22.-Last night nine negroes met death at the hands of a mob in the vicinity of Hemphill, in Sabine county. Today both races secured arms and the tension is such tonight that a race clash appears im minent.

THE LYNCHED.

Two weeks ago Hugh Dean and several other white men vis-fied the negro church and schoolhouse where a dance was in progress, pre-sumably in quest of liquor, it being the custom of some of the negroes to sell whisky during the progress of such afwhisky during the progress of such af-

During the evening Dean was killed and six negroes were held for the kil-ing. At the preliminary examination the evidence tended to show that the plot was formd at the dance to kill Dean

Dean. Saturday last, Aaron M. Johnson, a prominent farmer, was assasismated while seated at the dhing table with his wife and child, the bullet being fired through a window. For this crime Perry Price, a negro, was arrest-ed, and, it is stated, confessed, impli-cating Robert Wright, a relative of one of the negroes held for Dean's murder. Price declared he was offered \$5 to kill Johnson.

Then followed the forming of a mob last night, the overpowering of the jailer at Hemphill and the lynching of the six negroes held for the murder of Dean. Five were hanged to the same tree, while another attempted to escape and was shot to death. Later in the night William McCoy, another negro, was shot and killed while standing at the gate of the Johnson home, and this morning the bodies of two more ne-groes were found in the creek bottom. Wright, the negro who confessed to killing Johnson, and the man he im-plicated, were taken to Beaumont for safe keeping, under guard of the mili-tary company of San Augustine. Secy. of War Oliver, who now is at Pine Camp witnessing the department of the east maneuvers, has given out this information. Asst. Secy. Oliver, in outlining the plan for the reorganization of the ma-tional and state troops, declared that the word militiaman is now a misnome: and that the state troops since the passage of the Dick bill by Congress are United States volunteers. The war department plan means nothing more nor less than that the moment this country gets into trouble the so-called national guard organiza-tions will cease to exist as such, and immediately become units of the regu-lar army absolutely under the control of the presidem and the secretary of war. States. Asst. Secy, of War Oliver, "This scheme," said Gen. Oliver, "is the first move in the plan to make this country a military power. Before this we have had no authority over the state troops, better known perhaps as milita and neitenest sured operation.

we have had no authority over the state troops, better known perhaps as militia and national guard organiza-tions. What we propose to do is to organize these state troops and all the regular forces into eight army corps and the New England states. New York and other states in the military division, as the department of the east will constitute the first army corps. "The maneuver grounds here on Pine Camp, if the government buys them, will be the place where the national and state troops that will be in the first army corps will have their field train-ing. In other words it means that two years hence 50,000 men will be mobilized on this plain. "As at present planned the war de-partment will be able to put into the field almost immediately an army of 250,000 men. Part will be perfectly trained, and the efficiency of the rest will be so increased that they will form a smooth working force. "This new plan obviates all possibil-ity of confusion in the event of a sud-den call to arms. There will be no troops around the country in hap-haz-ard fashion, and every regiment, state and regular, will know exactly where it belongs and where it is to go. The plan will facilitate every feature of mobilization. It will be my duty to put this plan into operation, but should the necessity rise, my successor can carry on the work without the slightest interruption, so perfectly and so thor-oughly worked out are the plans of the denternet.
