

Mr. Dusenberry presented petition of Oliver Thornton and 58 others, asking for the extension of the boundaries of American Fork City, and moved its reference to the committee on municipal corporations, etc. Read and referred.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary, presented the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee on judiciary, to whom was referred H. F. No. 54, A bill amending sections 1603 and 1692 of the Compiled Laws of Utah, have had the same under consideration, and herewith report the same back with an amendment, and recommend its passage as amended.

Amendments read and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Lyman H. F. No. 54, "A bill amending sections 1603 and 1692 of the Compiled Laws of Utah," was read the third time by sections and passed.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary presented the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee on judiciary respectfully ask leave to report back H. F. No. 56 with amendments, and recommend its passage as amended.

Amendments read and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Penrose H. F. No. 56, "A bill to amend an act for the protection of the keepers of inns, hotels and boarding houses," approved February 15, 1876, was read and passed.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary, presented the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee on judiciary to whom was referred H. F. No. 43, respectfully ask leave to report back said bill with amendments, and recommend its passage as amended.

Amendments read and adopted.

On motion of Mr. Jacques, H. F. No. 43, "Relating to proceedings in Probate Courts," was read and passed.

Mr. Penrose, chairman of education, presented the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee on education, to whom was referred H. F. No. 47, "A bill providing for the establishment and support of district schools and for other purposes," beg to report the same back without amendment and recommend that it be put upon its passage.

H. F. No. 47, "A bill providing for the establishment and support of district schools," was read the first time, and, on motion of Mr. Francis, the usual number were ordered printed, and the bill made special order for Thursday, 12th inst.

Mr. Hatch presented the following resolution:

Resolved, The Council concurring, that a committee of five members be appointed on the part of the House, to join such committee as may be appointed on the part of the Council, to prepare and submit a bill dividing the Territory into Council and Representative districts, in pursuance of the provisions of an Act of Congress, approved June 19, 1878. Read and adopted.

The Speaker appointed Messrs. Hatch, Lyman, Penrose, Smith and Preston said committee on the part of the House.

House adjourned until Wednesday, at 2 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Grover presented petition of Thomas Miller and 28 others, in relation to foul brood in bees. Referred to committee on agriculture.

Mr. Dusenberry presented petition of M. Tanner and 29 others on the same subject. Referred.

Mr. Fisher presented petition of T. B. Clark and 52 others, residents of Farmington, in relation to the "no fence" law. Read and referred to committee on agriculture.

Mr. Farr presented petition of Gilbert Belknap, collector at Weber County, asking for \$33.80 remission of certain taxes. Referred to committee on claims, etc.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary, reported H. F. No. 67, Amending sections 2108 and 2115 Compiled Laws, defining grand larceny; a substitute bill for H. F. No. 5, rejected.

H. F. No. 67 was adopted as substitute, read the second and third times. Further action was postponed until to-morrow.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary, reported back H. F. No. 59, "To provide for a jury fund in civil cases," with amendments. Amendments adopted, and bill read second and third times and passed.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary

reported back C. F. No. 23, "The opium bill," with amendments. Amendments adopted and bill read and passed.

A message from the Council was received announcing the passage of C. F. No. 29, "To punish persons entering into or upon railroad cars in certain cases."

C. F. No. 29, was read the first time and referred to the committee on counties.

The following message from the Clerk of the Council was received and read:

I am directed to inform your Honorable body that the Council has this day passed H. F. 58, "creating Castle County," with amendments.

Council amendments to H. F. No. 58, "Creating Emery County," were read and adopted.

A message from the Council was received, stating that the Council had adopted House concurrent resolution on re-districting the Territory, with an amendment, by inserting the words "and to apportion the legislative representation thereof" after the word "districts."

Council amendment to the concurrent resolution adopted.

Mr. Farr, chairman of the judiciary, presented the following report:

Your committee on judiciary, to whom were referred the following bills, ask leave to report them back with substitutes, the passage of which they recommend:

H. F. No. 8, "A bill for the re-arrangement of the First and Third Judicial Districts."

H. F. No. 41, "A bill allowing rewards to convicts, and commuting their term of sentence."

Also H. F. No. 4, "A bill to establish the validity of divorces."

Which your committee ask leave to report back for the action of the House thereon.

On motion of Mr. Grover, the reading of the accompanying bills was deferred to come up in order, after H. F. No. 64.

H. F. No. 64, "A bill amending an act to provide revenue for the Territory of Utah and the several counties thereof," approved February 22, 1878, was read the third time by its title and passed.

Mr. Farr presented the following report:

Your committee on judiciary, to whom were referred the following bills, ask leave to report unfavorably upon them, as, in the judgment of your committee, no legislation is necessary at the present time.

H. F. No. 30, "A bill for an act creating the office of public administrator."

H. F. No. 37, "A bill regulating the practice of medicine and surgery."

H. F. No. 39, "A bill amending section 1434 of Compiled Laws of Utah."

H. F. No. 42, "A bill for an act in relation to mortgages of personal property."

H. F. No. 52, "A bill to regulate assignments by insolvent debtors, etc."

H. F. No. 63, "A bill to protect the people of the Territory of Utah against incompetent practitioners of medicine, surgery and obstetrics."

On motion of Mr. Sharp, the report was accepted, and the recommendation of the committee adopted.

Messages from the Council were received, stating that the Council had passed (H. F. No. 43), "Relating to the proceedings of Probate Courts," without amendments, also that that body had concurred in House amendments to (C. F. No. 23), "Prohibiting the smoking and chewing of opium."

Mr. Preston, chairman of enrollment, presented the following report:

Your committee on enrollment report that they have enrolled and carefully examined (H. F. No. 58), "An Act creating the County of Emery, etc., and at 4.40 p. m., this day, have handed it to His Excellency, the Governor, for his approval.

The following message from the Acting Governor was received and read:

Hon. Orson Pratt, Sen., Speaker of the House of Representatives:

Sir—I return herewith, not approved, (H. F. No. 6), entitled "An Act amending section seventeen hundred and thirty-two (1732) of the Compiled Laws of Utah."

The sentiment of the legislation by Congress, affecting the interest of this Territory, seems to favor the view that the Federal Courts should have concurrent jurisdiction with justices' courts, and that litigants should have the privilege of exercising a choice as to courts.

Mr. Farr presented petition of John Alford and others, grand and petit jurors of the Third District Court for the February term, 1880, asking for an appropriation to pay them for their services at the present time, which was read and referred to the committee on claims, etc.

House adjourned until Thursday, at 2 o'clock p.m.

I see going the rounds of the papers an account of a physician who lost an arm, and nearly his life, by blood poisoning, through the introduction of the virus of mortification of human flesh—through a pin scratch in the hand—just previous to the performance of a surgical operation.

In cases of erysipelas swelling apply it in thin slices over the whole surface inflamed, and change often.

The liver is the absorbent in all of the forms of animal life, and its powers of absorption of poisonous virus in the blood are sovereign.

AN ACT

PRESCRIBING FEES FOR THE SECRETARY OF UTAH TERRITORY.

Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Utah: That from and after the passage of this act, the fees of the Secretary of Utah Territory shall be as follows: For each commission issued to a probate judge, mayor, alderman or justice of the peace, One dollar (\$1.00); for each certificate of qualification of any officer, One dollar (\$1.00); for each commission issued to a notary public, Two dollars (\$2.00); for filing papers of incorporations, Three dollars (\$3.00); for each commission issued to a commissioner of deeds, Five dollars (\$5.00); for any other commission, One dollar (\$1.00).
