

SENATE FAVORS HIGHER SALARIES

Would Give President \$100,000 a Year, Chief Justice \$15,000, Associate Justices \$14,000.

CARRIAGES OR AUTOMOBILES

Warren Was for Them and Dixon Against—Money Thought Large Expenditures Not Necessary.

Washington, Jan. 19.—The salaries of the president, vice president and speaker of the house were again under discussion in the senate today when the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill was taken up. Amendments were adopted increasing the president's salary to \$100,000, that of the chief justice of the supreme court to \$15,000, and that of associate justices to \$14,000.

Senator Warren, in charge of the bill, expressed the hope that the allowance of \$5,000 annually for carriages or automobiles for the speaker and the vice president would be allowed to stand.

Senator Bailey offered an amendment to eliminate the words "other vehicles" so as to prevent the purchase of automobiles. Then he delivered a glowing tribute to the horse. Mr. Warren declared that on his own he would not buy a horse, but he would hunt up and save the horse, and some time he has sent an automobile 200 miles to save sheep that otherwise would perish.

Mr. Dixon opposed the appropriation of government money for carriages. Mr. Hemenway said that if Congress was to provide carriages for heads of departments and others in the executive branch of the government, he thought they should be allowed the vice president and the speaker of the house. Money argued that large expenditures were not necessary to maintain the dignity of office.

Mr. Borah said he would offer an amendment doing away with all official carriages.

Mr. Hale commented on the increase of expenditures in battleships, which he said was so great that the mere interest on the amount expended on one of them was more than all the increase of salaries provided for in this bill. "We shall," he said, "never reduce the expenses of the government until we take in hand, not only the question of salaries, but the enormous expenditures that we are asked to make for the military."

He called attention to the fact that we face a deficit in the revenues of \$120,000,000.

By a vote of 40 to 21 the provision of \$5,000 each annually for carriages and horses for the president, the vice president was stricken from the bill.

An amendment to reduce the salary of the president to \$100,000 was adopted by a vote of 35 to 30. The Republican senators who voted against the increase were Beveridge, Borah, Brown, Burkett, Clark, Deliver, La Follette and Miller. No Democratic senators voted in favor of the increase. An amendment was adopted providing for an "under-secretary of state," to be paid \$10,000 a year.

The salary of the chief justice of the supreme court of the United States was fixed at \$15,000, instead of \$13,000, as at present, and the salaries of associate justices at \$14,000, instead of \$12,500.

The bill was still under discussion when the senate adjourned.

RAILROADS MAY CARRY LIBERTY BELL FREE

Portland, Or., Jan. 20.—Chairman Martin A. Knapp of the Interstate Commerce commission has ruled that the transcontinental railroads which carry the Liberty bell to the Pacific coast for the annual celebration of the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence may carry the historic relic free of charge. Chairman Knapp's decision says that if the Liberty bell is to be carried by rail for state or municipal governments for charitable purposes or to and from a fair or exposition, it may be carried free. The railroads had already offered to do this, but the commission would consent.

CHARGED POLYGAMY IS PRACTISED IN COLORADO

Denver, Colo., Jan. 19.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Colorado Federation of Women's Clubs, Mrs. Adrianna Hungerford, president of the Colorado W. C. T. U., charged that polygamy was being practised openly in the southern portion of the state.

The meeting was held to discuss a resolution to be submitted to the legislature, asking Congress to enact an anti-polygamy amendment to the federal Constitution.

Mrs. Hungerford named the valley between Telluride and Durango as the locality where polygamy was most openly practised, and detailed numerous instances in support of her statement. She stated that a large number of Mormon families practise polygamy in that section.

FOREST REGULATIONS.

Gifford Pinchot Promises to Modify Them to Avoid Friction.

Denver, Jan. 18.—Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot of the Colorado State Forestry association and read at the annual meeting of the association a paper giving assurance of his desire to remove objections to the rules of his department within the law. One of the chief causes of friction, he says, is the disposition of the land, which is a subject of contention between the state and the American mining congress some understanding will be reached that will remove this cause of friction. Pinchot lays stress upon the claim that the forestry bureau, in most instances, is not to blame for the loss of timber, but to issue upon application, if it is difficult, he says, to investigate as to the cause of the loss.

Pinchot, a prominent figure in the land, etc., but the final disposition of the land will be made by the land office. For this reason, he thinks, a great deal of unnecessary criticism falls upon the forestry service.

ROOSEVELT TO LECTURE AT FOREIGN UNIVERSITIES

Washington, Jan. 19.—President Roosevelt has accepted an invitation of the University of Berlin to give a lecture to the students and faculty of the university in May, 1909. The invitation was made by Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, and was sent by the German emperor, Mr. Roosevelt, it is expected, will visit Berlin before he goes to the Sorbonne in Paris, one of the University of Oxford, and the one he has promised to deliver in Berlin.

FINAL ARGUMENTS IN MISSOURI RAILWAY CASE

Kansas City, Jan. 20.—Final arguments in the cases of the 18 Missouri railroads that are contesting the state 2-cent passenger and maximum freight rate acts, on the ground that they are confiscatory, were begun in the federal court here today before Judge Smith McPherson. Frank Hagerman, who presented the arguments for the railroads, declared that three companies have shown an actual loss in carrying passengers at 2 cents, while the returns from the other railroads show profits of only 2 1/2 to 3 per cent.

Sanford B. Ladd of Kansas City, who followed Mr. Hagerman opening for the state, asserted that one road, the Burlington, whose officials asserted it had lost \$100,000 in its state freight business in 1904, had, as a matter of fact, shown a profit of about \$50,000.

Gov. Lilley dropped.

Washington, Jan. 19.—George L. Lilley, who was inaugurated governor of Connecticut on Jan. 19, for the first time, sent in the house, was dropped from membership of that body today.

DIAMOND THIEF WORKED A SLICK GAME

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Thieves yesterday secured \$1,100 worth of precious stones from William Hassweiler, a diamond merchant, a tall, slender man with a black mustache, engaged by Hassweiler's office and told him he was wanted at the telephone across the hall. Leaving an assistant in the room, Mr. Hassweiler went to the telephone.

While Mr. Hassweiler was talking to an accomplice of the first man, the fellow entered the office for the second time and told the assistant that his employer wished to see him immediately. The assistant ran out and while he was away the thief took two papers of diamonds from an open safe.

MINER THREW HOLD-UP OVER BRIDGE RAILING

Denver, Jan. 20.—William Cahn, a miner 50 years old, last night put to rout in a summary fashion a holdup gang who attempted to rob him on the Cherry creek bridge at Fourteenth and

Market streets, not a block away from the police station. Cahn says that when he met the man in the middle of the bridge, the latter ordered him to throw up his hands. Instead Cahn seized his assailant and tossed him over the railing into the bed of the creek. The police later found footprints in the sand leading from the spot where the miner says he threw the would-be robber.

JUDGE CLELAND DEFIANT

Chicago, Jan. 20.—Threatened with being transferred and having a record of his mistakes published by Chief Jus-

tice Olson of the municipal court, Judge Cleland is still defiant and declares he will continue to run his court in his own way.

Objections to his parole system, the main feature of which is the suspended fine during the good behavior of the prisoner, have been voiced by his associates and a committee of judges has been appointed to inquire into the legality of some of his actions.

ETHICS FOR MEDICAL MEN.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—A code of ethics which will bring closer together the medical and pharmaceutical profes-

sions and result in the betterment of public service has been determined upon by the Chicago Medical association and the Chicago Retail Druggists' association.

A committee from both organizations will formulate a general code of ethics.
