### MOVING BEET CROP.

In an interview with Joseph Seely, who has charge of the planting and receiving beets in this vicinity the fol-lowing data was secured. Mr. Pleas-ant has 200 acres of beets planted this year, this being double the acresses of last year. The crop, on an average, is better than last year, running from 8 to 30 tons per acre. There will be at least calculations 100 cars shupped hetter than last year, running from 8 to 20 tons per acre. There will be at least calculations 100 cars shipped from Mt. Pleasant. Although the har-vest has just commenced the railroad is not able to clear the tracks as fast as the care are loaded, there being some 11 or 12 loaded cars awaiting shipment. This makes it rather in-convenient also for the farmers be-cause the loaded cars are in the way of the teams. This condition is brought about from the fact that the beet train is loaded to its fullest cap-acity before reaching here.
