**A REMEDY FOR LOCKJAW.**—A correspondent in an exchange writes: "I have noticed lately several deaths by lockjaw, and for the information of all, I will give a certain remedy. When any one runs a nail or any sharp iron in any part of his body, take a common smoke-pipe, fill it with tobacco, light it well, then take a cloth or silk handkerchief, place it over the bowl of the pipe, and blow the smoke through the stem into the wound; two or three pipefuls will be sufficient to set the wound discharging. I have tried it myself, and five others, and found it gave immediate relief. If the wound has been some days standing, it will open again if the tobacco is good. Try it, any one who may chance to get such a wound.—[Ex.]

**BOILING GLASS INTO A SYRUP.**—In the city of Lille, France, there is a factory of "water glass," a compound of fifteen parts of quartz, ten of potash, or nine of soda, and one of carbon. When dry it is transparent, hard, and fusible at a high heat. When fine powdered it is soluble in boiling water, and after being boiled for a time with five times its weight of water, makes a syrup which dries when exposed to the air, and makes a beautiful fire-proof varnish. Among other valuable properties of the water glass, it changes chalk into a hard stone, susceptible of a fine polish. The invention promises to take a very important place in the arts.—[Ex.]

**A RECEIPT FOR MENDING CHINA.**—From an English Almanac we cut a receipt for mending china a long time since, and the opportunity having occurred for trying, we found it admirable, the fracture scarcely being visible after the article was repaired.

It is thus made:—Make a very thick solution of gum arabic in water, and stir into it plaster of Paris until the mixture becomes a viscous paste. Apply it with a brush to the fractured edges, and stick them together. In three days the article cannot again be broken in the same place. The whiteness of the cement renders it doubly valuable.—[Ex.]

**ELECTRICAL CLOCKS.**—A Paris correspondent of the New York Commercial says that the municipal administration has raised at regular distances on the Boulevard Sebastopol, columns surmounted with candelabra of a particular form, lighted with gas. On these candelabra clock dials have been ingeniously placed, marking the hour, the minute and the second for the day as well as the night, by means of electricity. This is the first application at Paris, on a grand scale, of electricity as a regulator of public clocks. The experiment succeeds perfectly.

**ointment for the cure of PILES.**—Wm. W. Riley, of Mansfield, Ohio, obtained a patent for this ointment in 1844. It is composed of 2 ounces of flour of sulphur, 1 ounce of powdered nut galls, 1 grain of powdered opium, all intimately mixed with lard, until the ointment is of the proper consistency. It is applied to the parts affected twice every twenty-four hours until a cure results. This ointment has the appearance of being pretty good for the purpose designed.—[Scientific American.]
